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GOOD SPEAKERS WILL ADDRESS SAFETY SCHOOL

"Educating the Workman" and "Foreman's Safety Responsibility" are the two subjects for the second session of the safety instruction course for foremen, superintendents and plant supervisors to be held tomorrow night, Tuesday, September 22, in the auditorium of Public School No. 11, Bergen Square, Jersey City.

The speakers for the second session are: E. F. Larchar, of the Thomas A. Edison Company of West Orange, who will talk on the first named subject and W. Graham Cole, safety engineer of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company of New York, who will discourse on the responsibility of the foremen insofar as the safety of the men under him is concerned.

Mr. Larchar is chairman of the industrial safety committee of the Newark council and has created an enviable reputation for himself in the field of industrial safety. In addition to that, he is said to be a highly interesting speaker.

Mr. Cole is one of the national figures in industrial safety work in this country and also has the knack of telling his story in an interesting and attractive fashion.

E. A. Timm, chairman of the industrial safety committee, which is conducting the school has announced that the plan of holding a 15-minute entertainment preceding the opening of the school, will be adhered to during the entire course. The industrial bosses derived so much enjoyment from the quarter hour's entertainment furnished at the first session by J. Darnell Britton, industrial secretary of the Bayonne Y. M. C. A., that there has been a unanimous demand for more of the same kind of fun. Mr. Britton was an unqualified success, judging from the laughter and applause which greeted his efforts, and the committee is hopeful of inducing him to play a return engagement later on in the course.

The entertainment will be slightly different at next Tuesday's session. It will be furnished by L. A. Taft, chief clerk of the Texas Company of Bayonne and Frank M. Tiliou, of the same concern. Mr. Taft has a big reputation as a singer in Bayonne, and has promised to oblige with several of the songs he is noted for, including "Captain John McPerson" and "When I'm Dreaming of Erin I'm Dreaming of You." Mr. Tiliou will alternate with his associate by giving an address on his well known ability to "make the piano speak."

A general warning has been issued to all of the members of the school that they will be the losers if they fail to arrive in time to hear this program.

Mrs. Timm announces that the policy of the committee to start the school session promptly at 8 o'clock and stop at the dot of 9, will be adhered to through the course.

An interesting feature of the school, it is said, is the fact that it has attracted a considerable number of industrial executives, many of whom have announced their intention of attending all of the sessions with their men. The ten-minute discussion period following each twenty minute talk proved to be one of the most attractive features of the school.
