With Democratic Leaders—
Is Due In New York To-Day

ANTI-TWO-THIRDS RULE FORCES REPORTED ACTION

Bryan's Suggestion That South
and West Unite Against East
Meets With Cold Reception

WASHINGTON, May 21.—With his
eye still fixed on the Presidential
nomination of 1928, William Gibbs
McAdoo is holding a series of political
conferences with Democratic leaders
throughout the East.

Mr. McAdoo spent to-day in Wash-
ington, coming here from Louisville,
and will be at the Vanderbilt Hotel,
New York, to-morrow. He will re-
main there about a week.

Pronounced efforts are being made
to divorce Mr. McAdoo's Eastern pil-
grimage from any political atmo-
sphere. Back of it is the well-founded
rumor that the McAdoo forces are
lining up to bring about an abroga-
tion of the two-thirds rule in the
Democratic Convention which Mr.
McAdoo holds responsible for his fail-
ure to get the nomination at the
Madison Square Garden convention in
New York.

Shaver Opposes Movement

The McAdoo forces also are endeavor-
ing to force the National Committee
into renewed activity, which is being
resisted by Chairman Shaver, who is
standing out against any effort on the
part of any faction to gain possession
or control of the committee previous
to the Congressional elections.

The recent pronouncement made by
the Bryan brothers, William Jennings
and Charles W., to the effect that the
South and West should be brought
into a coalition to blanket the East in
its influence in Democratic councils,
also is being considered in connection
with the McAdoo foray into the East.
Mr. McAdoo was in consultation
with Gov. Fields while in Kentucky
and with James P. Brown, publisher
and supporter.

While in Washington, his move-
ments were unobtrusive and it was
explained he had "held no confer-
ences." The men with whom he
talked were "social friends" only. Mr.
McAdoo spent some time with Mrs.
Woodrow Wilson and was in confer-
ence with Daniel C. Roper.

May Be Active Here

It is expected that his circle of
conferences will not be so circum-
scribed when in New York.

So far as can be learned here, the
Bryan suggestion that the South and
West be united into a sectional oppo-
sition to the East is not meeting with
special favor among the Southern
leaders, and is receiving only acade-
mic attention in the West. Neither
is the suggestion that the two-thirds
rule be abrogated meeting with favor
among the leaders of the South.

The two-thirds rule is predicated
upon well-established "Democratic"
doctrine to which the South is strong-
ly attached, and it is recognized that
its abrogation necessarily would be
accompanied by the elimination of the
binding character of the unit rule to
which the South clings tenaciously.

dent, this board is undertaking a
comprehensive study of the problems
which the United States is facing as
the largest producer and the largest
consumer of petroleum with rapidly
diminishing reserves. I would appre-
ciate your views on the important
question of possible substitutes for
domestic oil and the products now de-
rived therefrom."

The letter is signed by Secretary of
Interior Work as Chairman.

Original plans had called for presen-
tation to the Public Health conference

the last minute, however, that such
things were not in its province, since
it was called to consider only the
danger of lead and not the lack of

Houses of Congress to
Concur in Asking Information

ASKS ATTORNEY GENERAL FOR RULE IN HIS FAVOR

Other Commissioners Attack
Policy and Declare Body Is
Diverted From True Purpose

WASHINGTON, May 21.—The fight
in the Federal Trade Commission pre-
cipitated by the new rules brought
about through the accession of Wil-
liam E. Humphrey to the Commis-
sion became more heated to-day when
it was learned Mr. Humphrey has ap-
pealed to the Attorney General for a
ruling which will permit the commis-
sion to ignore demands for investiga-
tions made by one branch of Congress
alone.

The ruling asked for applies to the
custom of having investigations started
by action of one body of Congress
alone. Most of these investigations have
come from the Senate where the lib-
eral Senators have been able to in-
augurate them by putting knotty
problems up to the Senate. The
custom in the Senate has been to
avoid responsibility by passing the in-
vestigation on to the Federal Trade
Commission.

Mr. Humphrey takes the position
that actions initiated by such men as
Senators Norris, La Follette and Ship-
stead are for the purpose of harassing
business.

The protecting attitude toward busi-
ness taken by Mr. Humphrey is
meeting vigorous opposition from
Commissioners Thompson and Nugent,
who say the purposes of the creation
of the commission are being destroyed.
They maintain the object of the
commission, as originally created, was
neither to harass business nor to pro-
tect it, but to protect the public
against bad business methods.

The position of the minority rebels
on the commission will be expressed
in New York to-morrow by Commis-
sioner Houston Thompson, who will
tell his side of the story in an ad-
dress before the Federal Council of
Churches at the home of the National
Board of the Y. M. C. A., Lexington
Avenue and 52d Street.
