Memorandum: Mr. A. E. Mittnacht

Confirming our conversation this morning regarding the case of the stolen can of ETHYL Fluid, I am giving you herewith the story as developed at this time.

Yesterday afternoon two children, one about six and one about three, found a can of ETHYL Fluid in an adjacent neighbor's yard. The younger one took a hammer and nail and commenced to drive it into the can. The fluid from the intact of the hammer splashed out and over him. The child in question, age three, is the son of a Greek proprietor at Penns Grove.

After developing the details to substantiate the above story, and which I found to be true, I took this matter up with the Dye Works' Police and Medical Departments. This morning I went to Penns Grove and located the can which yet contained about 200 cc's of ETHYL Fluid. I also secured the child's clothing which were quite well covered with ETHYL Fluid.

I found that the can was one of the new type series, B-1167. Our records show it to be one from our stock not yet having been shipped which naturally would be expected. This particular can was filled during May of this year. A count of our can stock reveals the fact that we are one short and bears out the evidence that it is one actually taken from this batch.

The adjacent property to the Greek restaurant is occupied by a man who now works at the Dye Works and had been previously occupied by another Dye Works' employee who had been discharged on account of certain dishonest practices. The Police Department is investigating this end in an effort to run down the party who took the can from our warehouse.

We are as careful as possible in the handling of these cans, but there are times particularly during the filling and during the packing when someone unobserved might get into the canning room and take a can away concealed in his overalls, and I believe under only these conditions could a can get away from us even though we try to prevent even these occasions.

Regarding the child, a Doctor Baker, one of the local Penns Grove physicians, immediately called the Dye Works yesterday afternoon to secure advice as to treatment for a child exposed to tetraethyl lead. This attending physician of the case verified the facts to me this morning. I have asked him to eliminate the usual medical ethics involved and to release the case to Doctor Deuel, the head doctor at the Dye Works, who is fully competent to deal with any lead poison case. He is going to take the child under observation in order that we are sure nothing serious will develop.

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
