

U. S. Shooters *figure prominently* In 1930 Averages

LAST year, as in all other years, shooters of the popular U. S. Climax and Defiance trap loads won important places in the trapshooting averages. Among those so far reported as finishing at the top or near the top in the various divisions are the following:

W. B. SALE, Denver, Colo.—1st in 500 to 1000 Professional Singles Class, with 496x500 . . . for the remarkable average of .9920.

BOYD F. DUNCAN, Lucy, Tenn.—1st in 500 to 750 Professional Doubles Division, with 460x500, an average of .9200. Duncan also placed 4th in the 2000 to 3000 Professional Singles Class, breaking 2579x2500.

DR. A. T. MONISMITH, Fort Lupton, Colo.—Runner-up in 1000 to 1500 Amateur Handicap Division, with 916x1000—average, .9160.

CHAS. A. BOGERT, Sandusky, O.—Finished among first ten in 4000 and Over Amateur Singles Class, smashing 4148x4275 for the fine average of .9702.

MISS MARION HARDY, Memphis, Tenn.—4th in 3000 to 4000 Singles Division for women, with 3007x3700—average, .8127.

MRS. J. H. CAMPBELL, Paducah, Ky.—3rd in 1000 to 2000 Singles Class for women, with 912x1000—average, .9120.

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
