be made in the case of the United States. The gulf between the two powers is so great that trade will have to wait for the easing of political tension.

Communist authorities themselves are very reluctant to discuss trade.

Figures from other nations, however, including Communist states, permit a fairly accurate picture to be drawn, showing a decrease in total Chinese foreign trade since 1959, with the Communist countries percentage of the total also declining.

FARM TROUBLES

Agricultural difficulties made it essential for Communist China to buy grain. The Soviet Union and her East European partners were apparently unable to supply it in the quantities needed. So China bought where she could—in Canada, Australia, South America, and elsewhere.

The need for grain purchases is likely to continue for some time.

This means much exporting will have to be done in Japan, Western Europe, Britain, Canada, Hong Kong and Southeast Asia, instead of to East Europe.

BUSINESSMEN

Trade representatives at embassies in Peking and foreign businessmen visiting Communist China have noticed another trend in the country's new trading ideas.

They have found more and more Communist Chinese representatives abroad and in key posts in official government trading corporations. They are former capitalist businessmen with long experience in foreign trade.

PRICES

Western businessmen believe these changes are a hopeful sign, promising better relations in the future.

These men understand international trade and finance, an European business executive told me recently.

"They knew that the West can produce some things better and more cheaply than East Europe. They know we can often offer better terms. They know the

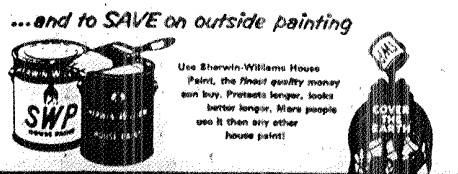

It's true. You say Maury Wills as a sort of to doom which will bring in enough scratch to meet the overdraft at the bank.

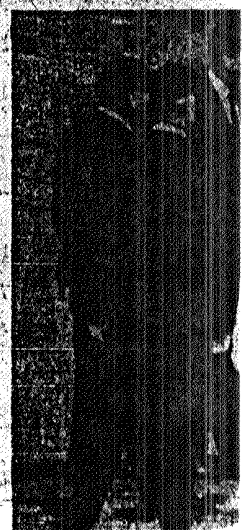
