This plan of year-by-year development is favored by the harbor committee which stated that it would not work a hardship on the taxpayer, would furnish sufficient money over a 10-year period and permit the city to pay as it goes.

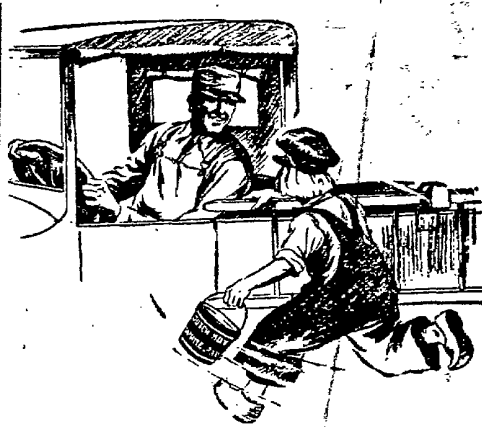

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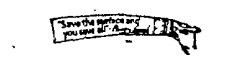
