Timms, Hickey, Brittin Aid County Council Plan

Opening Class of Industrial Course to Be Held Tonight

Final arrangements for this evening's opening session of the Safety Instruction Course for Foremen, Superintendents and plant supervisors, at Public School No. 11, Bergen Square, were made by the Industrial Safety Committee of the Hudson County Safety Council yesterday afternoon in the Public Service Building, Journal Square, Jersey City.

The speakers at tonight's session will be Arthur H. Young Curtis, Fostick & Belknap, New York, whose subject is "Safety Supervision Required in Modern Leadership" and Deputy Commissioner of Labor John Roach who will talk on "The Foreman's Viewpoint."

Brittin Leads Program

A short entertainment which will begin at quarter to eight under the direction of H. Darnell Brittin of Bayonne, will precede the first session of the school and those industrial supervisors who arrive early will not find much difficulty, according to the Entertainment Committee, in spending the short time before the session begins.

E. A. Timm, Safety Supervisor of the Standard Oil Co., of Bayonne, and Chairman of the Industrial Safety Committee, will bang his gavel promptly at 8 o'clock when, it is expected all of the seven hundred men and women who have enrolled in the school from almost forty plants, will be assembled. Newton W. Belton, and Mr. Young will then be introduced with further delay. A ten minute discussion will follow his twenty minute talk, and a similar discussion will follow Mr. Roach's talk. The committee has arranged its program to provide for just one hour's session each Tuesday night.

It was announced at the conclusion of yesterday's meeting that the entertainment preceding each session will be varied and will be conducted and furnished by talent from various parts of the county.

Response Gratifies Timm

Chairman Timm and his associates expressed much gratification yesterday at the remarkable response to the invitations addressed to the industrial plants of the coun-

ty to send their supervisors to this, the first industrial activity, of the Safety Council. It was freely predicted that the enrollment would total well over eight hundred and probably a thousand before the week is over. More than fair sprinkling of the fair sex have enrolled in the school, it was announced, and special arrangements for their comfort and convenience will be made by David S. Joel, vice-chairman of the Recreation Committee and his associates.

In addition to a number of officers of the Safety Council, and the members of the Industrial Safety Committee, invitations to attend the first inaugural session of the course have been extended to public officials throughout the county to Manager Fred M. Rosseland, secretary-manager of the Newark Safety Council, David A. Patton, chairman of the Industrial Safety Committee of that organization.

Hickey to Lecture

The complete program for the remaining sessions of the course, follows: Sept. 22, "Educating The Workman," S. F. Larcher, Thomas A. Edison Co., West Orange; "Foreman's Safety Responsibility," W. Graham Cole, Safety Engineer, Metropolitan Life Insurance Co., New York; Sept. 29, H. L. Reid, Safety Inspector of the Bureau of Industrial Hygiene, Department of Labor of New York, who will talk on "Electrical Hazards;" to be followed by a talk on "Resuscitation" with demonstration by John Russell, Jr., Assistant Superintendent of Construction, Public Service Production Co., Newark; Oct. 6, "Eye Protection," Walter King, American Optical Co., New York, with slides and exhibits; Oct. 13, "Plant Conditions," R. S. Bonab, General Safety Supervisor Standard Oil Co.; Oct. 20, "Co-operation of the Foreman Required in Accident Prevention," E. W. Beck, U. S. Rubber Co.; "Management's Viewpoint," J. J. Hickey, president Foreman's Club of Bayonne.

Those who attend five of the six sessions will be awarded diplomas at a graduation banquet to be held on October 27 at which C. S. Ching, Supervisor of Industrial Relations, United States Rubber Co., will be the principal speaker.
