Fluid Cans

I note from copy of your memorandum of June 12 to Mr. Lewis that you have raised a question concerning the volume of can shipments in the first quarter of 1944. It is true that from the figures cited in Mr. Lewis' memorandum of June 7 to all Division Managers, shipments in the first quarter of this year would appear to be somewhat below those for the first quarter of 1943. However, the reverse is actually true.

I had not intended supplying corrected figures for the comparative shipments, because I felt that the principle under discussion was correct, in that we are looking to ways and means of curtailing consumption of Fluid in camphore possible. Shipments given in Mr. Lewis' memoranda are only to some of the largest consumers, and the only important error is for Dayton Power & Light at Dayton, Ohio, to whom first quarter shipments this year totaled 132 cans, rather than zero as shown in the memorandum. Since the question is now up, I thought I might summarize can volume as shown by plant records. Comparative data for the first quarter of 1943 and 1944, by months are as follows:
