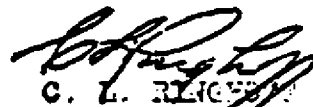

26 CONTRACTING AND SUPPLY COMPANY, insured during the period of exposure
27 at various times by AETNA CASUALTY AND SURETY COMPANY and TRAVELERS
28 INSURANCE COMPANY.

30 That the Workmen's Compensation Appeals Board (then Industrial
31 Accident Commission) issued its Findings and Award on November 6, 196
32 wherein the Applicant was awarded permanent disability of 62% which,

1 at the rate of \$52.50 per week, equaled \$13,020.00; temporary
 2 disability for the period beginning February 9, 1963 through June 9,
 3 1963 at the rate of \$70.00, and further medical treatment for the

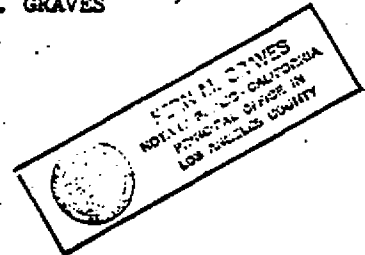

REFEREE'S MEMORANDUM ON HEARING

In his application as amended at the time of this hearing, the applicant alleges injury to his lungs by reason of exposure to asbestos during a period that began in 1941 and ended 2/8/63. The applicant elected to proceed against the last employer, Armstrong Contracting and Supply Company. However, the case could not go forward because Aetna Casualty and Surety Company did not have all of the coverage of the last employer. They admitted coverage beginning in January of 1963. Their information is that Travelers Insurance Company had coverage from April 2, 1961, which is the beginning date of applicant's employment with the said last employer, and up until the time Aetna's coverage began. Travelers Insurance Company was, therefore, joined as a party defendant.

No other insurance carriers were joined because the information with respect to the prior employers as set forth in applicant's attorneys' letter of 4/25/63 is quite sparse. Apparently Fiberglas Engineering and Supply Company was absorbed by Owens-Corning Fiberglass, and their carrier was the defendant Aetna. Aetna also insured Mudet Cork Corporation. Apparently Casualty Insurance Company of California and Enterprise Insurance Company were the carriers for Accurate Insulation Company. None of the prior employers were joined at this time. They will be joined at a later date if liability is established against the last employer, whose insurance carrier, as a matter of asserting their rights to contribution, can then proceed against the other employers and their carriers.

Dr. Schmerler in a First Report Of Injury diagnosed a chronic emphysema and fibrosis. Apparently he has been the attending physician. His bill in the sum of \$159.50 will be paid by Aetna. Applicant's Dr. Hoffmann indicated a diagnosis of possible asbestosis. Defendant Aetna's Dr. Mauer diagnosed pulmonary fibrosis that is probably secondary to industrial exposure to asbestos. He recommends further tests, including respiratory function tests, and Aetna will see that they are made. Meanwhile, Aetna will also make a monetary advance to applicant. His claimed period of temporary disability began 2/8/63 and ended 6/10/63. He is now working as an estimator for an asbestos firm.

A copy of this memorandum, together with a copy of the application and a copy of applicant's attorneys' letter of 4/25/63, will be served on Travelers Insurance Company so that they will be better advised.

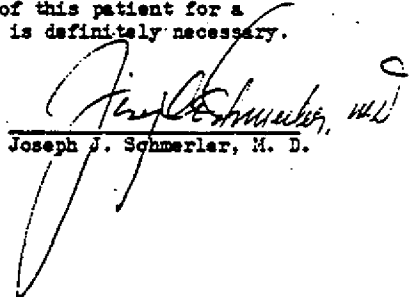

Patient is dyspneic on walking at a moderate pace, and severely dyspneic when walking fast or climbing stairs. However, he is comfortable sitting, standing or walking slowly.

Mr. Brokenshire is definitely partially disabled, and is unable to perform his previous duties, which included climbing ladders while heavily weighted.

Rehabilitation of this patient for a different occupation is definitely necessary.

PULMONARY FUNCTION STUDIES

The total vital capacity supine was decreased in a marked degree. The time vital capacity for three seconds was decreased in a marked degree and slightly less than the total vital capacity observed standing. The maximal breathing capacity was decreased in a marked degree. The maximal breathing capacity was increased from 78.8 to 112.7 liters per minute after one bronchodilator treatment with Isuprel indicating the presence of a moderate degree of bronchospasm. The shape of the spirogram tracing reveals a very slight prolongation of the rapid forced exhalation without evidence of air trapping. Inspiratory time on the rapid spirogram is prolonged indicating loss of lung elasticity. The timed vital capacity for 0.5 seconds was 1494 ml. (55.8% of the observed total vital capacity), normal. The timed vital capacity for 1.0 seconds was 2475 ml. (92.5% of the observed total vital capacity), normal. The residual air was measured both by the oxygen open circuit and the helium closed circuit methods and found to be decreased slightly. The total lung capacity was decreased in a marked degree. The residual air occupies 34.9% of total lung capacity and represents a slight moderate increase in this ratio above the normal predicted value. The ventilation factor was decreased in a moderate to marked degree. The ventilation factor is the average of the timed vital capacity for three seconds, the maximal breathing capacity and the residual percent of the total lung capacity, all expressed on the basis of the normal predicted value. The alveolar nitrogen was 1.1% after breathing oxygen for 5 minutes, normal. The nitrogen washout curve was obtained with continuous recordings of each breath on oxygen breathing on the nitrogen meter and a total time of 4.5 minutes was required to reduce the end tidal nitrogen to 1.0%. The shape of the nitrogen washout curve is smooth and uniform. The normal nitrogen washout is to an end tidal of 1% or less within 5 minutes and with a forced exhalation the alveolar should not exceed 1.5%. The nitrogen was out in this case with the nitrogen meter indicates normal air distribution in the lungs.

The arterial blood oxygen saturation at rest was 91.9% on air breathing (a moderate to marked decrease), and 90.0% with step-up exercise (a marked decrease). The exercise saturation was repeated walking on the treadmill in a steady state at 1.5 miles per hour ~~fast~~ with a 2% grade on air breathing and found to be 90% (the same as with the step-up exercise). With intermittent positive pressure breathing on compressed air only at rest the saturation was 96.2% (normal). The treadmill exercise was repeated at 1.5 miles per hour ~~fast~~ with a 2% grade on 32.75% oxygen breathing (increasing the inspired pO_2 from 146.9 on air breathing to 231.2 mm. Hg.) and with this level of oxygen breathing the saturation was 96.2% (normal 97% or more). After breathing 100% oxygen the saturation of the arterial blood was 99.7%, the CO_2 content 46.6 vols. percent and the pH 7.45. The CO_2 content on air breathing was decreased slightly both at rest and with exercise. The arterial blood pH was normal at rest and increased slightly with exercise. The hemoglobin was 14.59 grams based on oxygen capacity measurement and further checked with the Beckman DU Spectrophotometer cyanmethemoglobin method. The hematocrit was 40.4%.

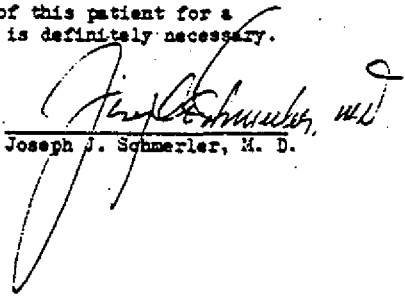

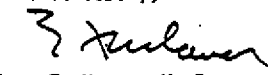
Pulmonary function studies were done by Dr. Motley on October 16, 1963. These studies reveal abnormal findings characteristic of pulmonary fibrosis. The figures reveal a moderate reduction in pulmonary function. It is obvious that this reduced function is due to the pathological changes noted by examination and particularly by the x-ray. These have been regarded as due to the inhalation of asbestos fibers.

On the basis of these studies, it is my belief that Mr. Brokenshire could be employed at an occupation which did not involve a degree of exertion which would cause shortness of breath. In other words, a sedentary job which involves an ordinary amount of walking about an office or even about an open site on level ground would not cause any difficulty. Any exertion, such as climbing ladders or climbing stairs, might produce dyspnea and discomfort although this would not increase the severity of the disease at this time. Any work prescription should also insure the avoidance of insulating materials particularly asbestos and fine dusts. This implies that his condition has not changed since the last examination, April 14, 1963.

Asbestosis is a progressive disease. It is likely that the degree of pulmonary fibrosis will progress in the coming years. The lesions is permanent, it is in all likelihood progressive, but at this time it is not totally disabling as indicated above.

The pulmonary ventilation measurements at rest reveal a normal minute ventilation, a normal oxygen uptake and a slight decrease in the percent of oxygen extracted from the inspired air breathed. The $\dot{V}_{E/R}$ when calculated on the basis of the resting oxygen uptake was +0.2% of his normal predicted value. With step-up exercise the minute ventilation was within the normal range, the oxygen uptake was decreased in a moderate to marked degree and the percent of oxygen extracted from the inspired air breathed decreased in a moderate degree. Dyspnea time was not prolonged after one minute of step-up exercise.

Direct tension measurements of arterial blood at rest reveal a pCO_2 at 36.6 mm. Hg. (normal 40) and a pO_2 of 80.5 mm. Hg. (normal 95). The effective tidal air at rest based on the expired pCO_2 and the arterial pCO_2 was 66.1% (normal 75% or more). With treadmill exercise in a steady state at 1.5 miles per hour ~~fast~~ with a 2% grade the arterial pCO_2 was 35.5 mm. Hg. and the arterial pO_2 77.4 mm. Hg.. The effective tidal air with the treadmill exercise was 72.8 based on the expired pCO_2 and the arterial pCO_2 , normal 75% or more. The carbon monoxide diffusing capacity measurement at rest was 5.58 and with step-up exercise 16.31 (CO uptake, cc. per minute per mm. Hg. alveolar pCO). Our normal values vary from 8 to 20 at rest and from 20 to 50 with step-up exercise. The valsalva test was obtained with direct recording of the brachial artery pulse pressure and this test was essentially normal. The average blood pressure as recorded directly from the brachial artery at rest supine was as follows: systolic 132, diastolic 62 and mean 80 mm. Hg..

In summary the pulmonary function studies reveal the absence of emphysema as a significant factor in this case. There is a marked reduction in the total lung capacity indicating a restrictive condition of the chest and lungs, most characteristic of fibrosis. The spirogram reveals no significant obstructive factor for the rapid forced exhalation. A moderate degree of bronchospasm was demonstrated as best indicated by the increase in the maximal breathing capacity after one bronchodilator treatment with Isuprel. There is significant hypoxia present both at rest and with exercise. The resting hypoxia was corrected with intermittent positive pressure breathing on compressed air only indicating the presence of poorly ventilated areas. However, it can be noted that the arterial pO_2 by direct tension measurement is higher proportionately than the arterial blood oxygen saturation based on Van Slyke measurements of oxygen content and oxygen capacity. This would indicate the perfusion of some blood through non-ventilated areas, a characteristic finding in fibrosis. Also it can be noted that even on a high level of oxygen breathing (32.75% oxygen), there was a slight decrease with exercise. The carbon dioxide is being blown off adequately. The decrease in the exercise oxygen uptake in this case indicates the presence of increased pulmonary vascular resistance and the inability to increase the pulmonary blood flow corresponding to the degree of exercise given. This again is a fairly common finding in restrictive conditions of the chest and lungs as best demonstrated in this case by the decrease in the total lung capacity. These studies would be consistent with hypoxia resulting from the fibrosis which also increases pulmonary vascular resistance and the inability to expand the pulmonary vascular bed in the normal manner corresponding to the mild exercise given. These findings would indicate the presence of a severe degree of pulmonary function impairment.

his return to a dusty occupation. Prior to November 1962 he was aware of shortness of breath "running up and down ladders" perhaps for the last five years. He also noted this on stairs. He does not cough. His ankles do not swell. He has a sense of constriction around the lower chest - noted mainly in bed. If he works in his garden this sense of constriction is noted "that night." He has never coughed up blood. He uses one pillow at night.

He stopped smoking six or seven years ago because of distaste. He was not instructed to do so.

consider his pulmonary lesions as due to occupational exposure. It would be necessary, therefore, to determine what the precise nature of exposure to substances adversely affecting the lung had been. As you know, certain types of asbestos do produce a chronic pulmonary lesion known as asbestosis.

Mr. Brokenshire does not cough or raise sputum, therefore, it is not possible to search for asbestos fibres in his bronchial secretions.

A quantitative assay of his pulmonary disability and a determination of secondary cardiac involvement could be made by performing respiratory function studies at the Pulmonary Function Laboratory under the direction of Dr. Motley at the Hospital of the Good Samaritan.

At the present time it is certain that there should be no further exposure to substances capable of causing pulmonary fibrosis. At the present time on the basis of information available the pulmonary lesions found here must be regarded as occupational.

Röntgen examination of the chest reveals a moderate semi-patchy accentuation of the markings throughout both lung fields somewhat sparing the left upper lobe region. Several of the areas of involvement show somewhat nodular change, particularly in the right upper lobe and at the left base. There is a diffuse accentuation of the reticular pattern throughout the right lung field and the lower half of the left lung field. Rather marked pleural thickening is present along the lateral chest wall on the right and at the left base. There also appears to be some calcification within the pleural in the mid-portion of the left lung field laterally. There appears to be slight flattening of the diaphragms, particularly the left. The cardiac shadow is within normal limits of size and shape. The hilar and mediastinal areas show no gross abnormality.

- IMPRESSION: 1. Old pleural thickening.
2. Chronic inflammatory process involving both lung fields. The possibility that this represents one of the pneumoconioses cannot be excluded.
