

Mail Service To War Countries Is Readjusted

Mail service from the United States to warring European countries has been slowed and re-routed, but is being continued, Postmaster Ralph Evans said today following receipt of the following communication from Acting Postmaster General W. W. Howes:

"While direct steamship service to Great Britain and France is less frequent than heretofore, the postoffice department is utilizing every opportunity at its command in forwarding both regular and parcels post mail.

"During the absence of direct steamship facilities to Germany and Poland, mail is being forwarded to other countries for transfer to its destination."

Mr. Howes said, the postmaster explained, that his department will exert every available effort to expediting all mail to addressees in these countries. Direct mail service to England and France, he pointed out, is on a less frequent schedule than heretofore; mail to Poland has to be rerouted through Rumania, while mail to Germany is dispatched to Amsterdam, from which it is sent on.

Letters to persons in these countries should be addressed the same as formerly, Mr. Evans said. He also called the attention of the public to the fact that transatlantic airmail is continuing, but not to the same European destinations as before. That going by the southern route stops at Lisbon, Portugal, rather than in France or England, while the northern planes land in Ireland.

In conjunction with the Palo Alto Light Opera Association, a community chorus will be given as part of the curriculum. The Toastmistress group is also under the night school's jurisdiction.

Additional courses under consideration are home hygiene and first aid, and real estate law and appraisal.
