The patient was the sole survivor of ten men on the same job who died before the age of 35 of respiratory disease thought to be tuberculosis.

These workers were victims of asbestosis, a lung disease caused by inhaling particles of asbestos.

The hazard of asbestos was not realized until 1927 when it was recognized that persons who worked with this material were subject to pulmonary fibrosis leading to bronchogenic carcinoma.

Recent observations make the relationship between asbestos exposure and malignancy a well documented fact.

In one group of cases of asbestosis, 41 per cent proved at autopsy to have lung cancer.

A recent British survey shows that 50 per cent of males with asbestosis die of pulmonary cancer.

In the United States and Canada there are 15,000 persons working in the production and manufacture of asbestos.

Many more are exposed to fibers and dusts in industries using asbestos.

Protection against exposure to asbestos through safety measures is urgent for workers.

Asbestos has been known and used in various capacities for centuries.

The Romans wove asbestos into cremation robes for ceremonial burials and Charlemagne had a tabernacle of asbestos which he kept clean by passing it through fire.

Television In Review

NEW YORK (UPI) — The redoubtable Leonard Bernstein, one of the magnificent pedagogues of the century, was smack dab in the middle of lecturing us about what sound music should have been and meantime losing a battle to keep his mop of hair back off his brow when a wry soul near my seat giggled and said: "He suddenly sounded like Robert Benchley."

You have to be of a certain age to appreciate that remark. Benchley was a man who wrote some of the light pieces for many years until he wrote himself out and then went to Hollywood and established a new career as an actor—making, notably, beautiful shorts lampooning lecturers trying to make things clear to an audience. The comparison with Bernstein is completely unfair, except that the eminent conductor does get powerful since in his enthusiasm to take us inside music. This is a great performer, a great personality, an utterly brilliant man—and when he devotes a show to making a point, he makes it charmingly and in full measure.

Obituaries

ENGLEWOOD, N.J. (UPI) — John R. Lutz, former chairman of the Stone and Webster Engineering Corp., died Tuesday at the age of 87. During his tenure with the company, Lutz directed the design and construction of the nuclear reactor at the University of Chicago, where the atomic bomb was developed.

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn. (UPI) — Thomas B. Tanner, long-time member of the Southern Newspaper Publishers' Association, died Tuesday of a heart attack at the age of 72.

Tanner was secretary-manager of the SNPA, which includes about 400 newspapers in 34 states, until his retirement last year.

FRESNO, Calif. (UPI) — Leslie Lowry, who set high diving records around the world under his professional name of Capt. Nick Carter, died Monday at the age of 83. He thrilled the nation with his sensational dives in the early part of the century. Among Lowry's noted feats were a world record set in 1898 when he dived 189 feet from the Big Four Bridge in Louisville, Ky., and a dive of 212 feet from a ship in the Suez Canal.

Then another passage, with applause at the end, and Bernstein: "Beautiful, you say?"

My companion said: "You know what he's doing? He's explaining camp—in music."

Del. Delivery Whatever it was, he did it with usual impeccable diction and delivery, dedication and intensity, and with delightful and amusing musical illustrations.

An orchestra he said, can be guilty of the sins of pride and of exaggeration in departing from what the composer intended. "The sound of an orchestra? There's no such thing. All that matters is the sound of the composer."

The Red Skelton Show came on with the announcement that the comedy clash of the century was about to begin—between Tullulah Bankhead and Red's Clem Kadiddlehopper. The "clash" was embarrassing to one who reveres Miss Bankhead's stature as an actress. Red's two pantomime sketches demonstrated again his genius in that field.

CBS News brought together squad of reporters and thinkers in one of the summing-up panels that are the custom this time of the year. This one examined "Where We Stand in Viet Nam," by a British journalist guest, James Cameron, who recently visited North Viet Nam.

"What this U.S. bombing has done," he said, "is

STUDENTS DEMONSTRATE

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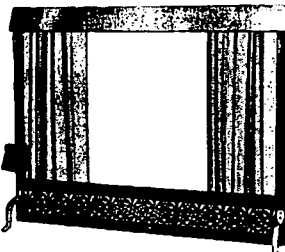
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
