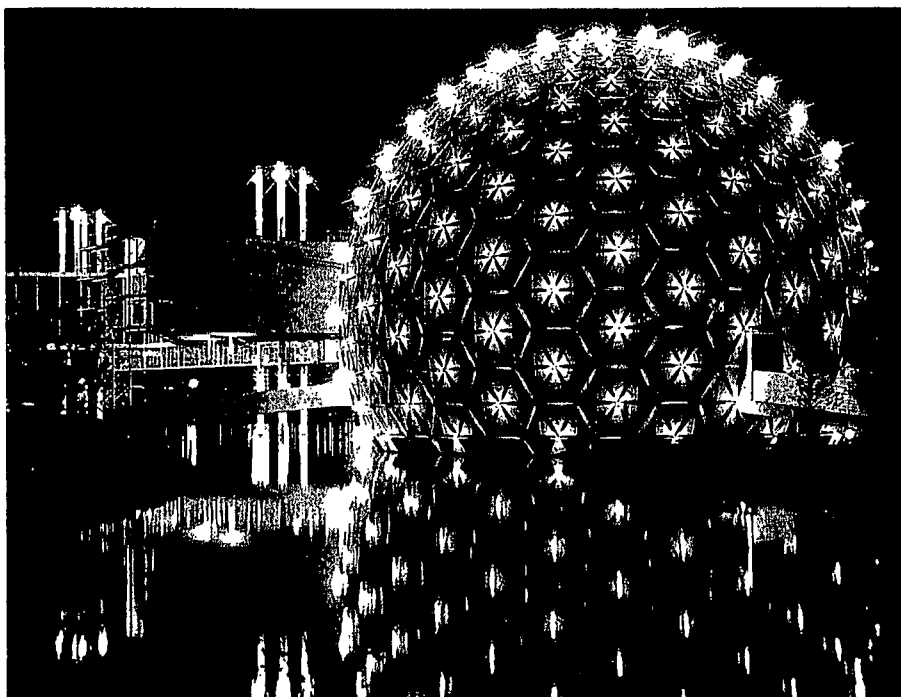


TOURS: Departing from the foot of Yonge Street, these hour-long tours wind through the tranquil lagoons of the Toronto Islands, past Centreville (a turn-of-the-century children's amusement park), and past the world-renowned Royal Canadian Yacht Club. The bustling harbor and breathtaking skyline are yours from the comfort of a glass-topped tour boat.

BLACK CREEK PIONEER VILLAGE: A "living" museum depicting life in rural Ontario in the 1800's. More than 30 carefully re-

wanted a castle of his own — so he built one, incorporating with meticulous detail the finest features of European castles. Sir Henry's "Dream Castle" includes 98 rooms, turrets, a magnificent pipe organ, secret passageways — even gold plated faucets in the bathrooms!

The list of things to see and do in this amazing city is endless. How about an African Lion Safari where more than 1000 exotic animals and birds roam free over 500 acres. Sports enthusiasts should

stored buildings are manned by "villagers" tending their chores (candle dipping, saddle making, etc.) and reliving life as it was in the early days.

A further bonus to the visitor is the Dalziel Barn Museum. This huge cantilever barn, built in 1809, now houses the largest collection of 19th century toys in Canada.

FORT YORK: This restored fort from the War of 1812 recreates the sights and sounds of an early 19th century British garrison, with guards uniformed as the Grenadier Company of the 8th Kings Regiment demonstrating military drills. **CASA LOMA:** "The House on the Hill" is actually a medieval castle, the work of Sir Henry Pellatt — soldier, financier and eccentric. He
