I have received your letter dated January 10th, and I have already answered it in fact by asking one of my associates, Dr. Machle, to visit and examine your son and find out how his condition is progressing.

I am very much pleased to know that he is improving and that there is every reason to believe that he will recover completely. I can assure you also that I shall be very happy to do what I can in the matter of some compensation. In as much as your son was not in my direct care, and in as much as I was somewhat disappointed in not having found it possible to investigate his case as thoroughly as I should have liked, I do not feel that it is possible for me to intrude into the matter too much and to make recommendations as to what should be done without some further information. Consequently I have been compelled to simply allow the matter to take its course. Possibly I should continue to do so, but my natural sympathies for yourself and your son lead me to do what I can for you in your present unfortunate circumstances.
