To the Stockholders:

We present herewith the Consolidated Balance Sheet and Consolidated Income and Surplus accounts of The Sherwin-Williams Company for the fiscal year ended August 31, 1961.

The earnings before Federal Income Tax and provision for the Pension Plan are \$21,810,258.

The amount estimated for Federal Income and Excess-Profits Tax is \$9,964,706. This calculation has been made on the basis of the new Revenue Act of 1961, enacted by Congress on October 20, 1961.

\$2,500,000 has again been set aside for the Pension Plan. This figure is approximately equivalent to the annual normal requirement of the Plan, together with 10% of the original past service liability, as estimated by the Company's actuaries.

The final consolidated net earnings after all deductions are \$9,545,548.

These net earnings, after allowing for Preferred Dividends, are equivalent to \$7.23 per share on the present outstanding 1,277,864 shares of Common Stock.

Sales were the largest in the Company's history, being 17% greater than the previous year.

In July of this year, the Company sold \$5,236,300 of its Preferred Stock to a group of banks and insurance companies. It was considered advisable to provide these additional funds for working capital and expansion of plant facilities.

The inventory has been valued at cost or market prices, whichever was the lower. For several years a reserve was set up to reduce prices still lower, to those prevailing in 1945 with respect to certain raw materials. Last year this reserve amounted to \$1,623,000, but at the end of this year, market prices of oils, which constituted the major portion of the inventories covered by the reserve, so closely approximated those of 1945 that the remaining differences in prices were not material. It was, therefore, decided to discontinue this plan, especially as no tax benefit was obtained by it.

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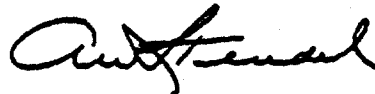
Since the introduction last year of our new product "Super Kem-Tone", we have sold over ten million gallons of this deluxe washable interior wall paint. Our nationally advertised enamel "Kem-Glo", which was introduced to the public in 1949, likewise has had a most enthusiastic market reception. During August of this year we filled our twenty millionth can of this outstandingly fine quality enamel.

About four million dollars were spent at the Company's various plants for modernization and for increasing our productive facilities. A new printing plant has been built at North Olmsted, Ohio, replacing the old one, which had been in use for over fifty years. This new unit will insure an adequate supply of color cards, advertising features, etc., to take care of our expanding volume. We are also increasing, under Certificate of Necessity, our production of Para Cresol, which product is important in the defense program and is used as an additive to gasoline for airplanes, automobiles, etc. Para Cresol is also an important basic ingredient in the manufacture of certain colors.

The Government's rearmament program is developing a gradually tightening raw material situation. Some of our most important raw materials, such as tin plate, zinc, lead, titanium, phthalic anhydride, certain colors and many chemicals are under allocation or restriction by Government Directives.

Our research and technical staffs are constantly at work developing new and better products for the home, farm and industry and are not only making the most of the available raw materials but have formulated from new raw materials many superior finishes which have proven their merit over years of severe laboratory testing technique. Many highly technical protective finishes have also been worked out and approved by Government Engineers for use in the Defense Program.

Once again I desire to thank our staff in our plants, branches and offices for their loyalty and enthusiastic support in promoting the interests of the Company.

Note A—In 1940 the Company adopted the policy of establishing reserves against inventories of certain oils and pigments which had the effect of reducing the amounts of these inventories in a basis equivalent to the last-in, first-out method of pricing inventories, based on prices during 1946. Such method was not adopted for federal income tax purposes because of certain provisions of the Internal Revenue Code, which provisions are still unchanged. In view of the fact that no tax benefit was obtained by this method, the Company, for this reason as well as other reasons, has decided to discontinue (as of September 1, 1950) pricing the inventories referred to on such last-in, first-out method. The effect of this change was to increase net profit for the year ended April 30, 1951, by approximately \$2,100,000.00.

Note B—Securities of subsidiaries and consolidated include investments of approximately \$1,419,000 in a Canadian subsidiary, and approximately \$1,037,000 in South American subsidiaries. The proportions share of accumulated net profits, not taken up, applicable to investments in subsidiaries not consolidated amounted to approximately \$5,000,000.

Note C—Net current assets (approximately 2 1/2% of consolidated net current assets) of consolidated foreign subsidiaries, located in Mexico and Cuba, have been translated into U. S. dollars at the applicable exchange rates in effect at August 31, 1961.
