Recently I noted in the Northwest Fruit Grower an article by Professor Talbot of Missouri on the "Spray Residue Hoax." In this article he calls attention to your studies. Have you any publication on the subject that you could send me? Personally I have been rather skeptical about arsenic and lead poisoning. For 30 years I have been testing fruit that has been thoroughly sprayed and I have never used any precaution in removing the spray residue. In my Division there are a number of others who have pursued a similar course, and as far as I can judge, no one has suffered from poisoning.
