SHOPPING & GETTING AROUND THE CITY

The diversity, excellence and convenience of the city's stores and their mer-

chandise makes shopping in Dallas a most enjoyable experience. (Retail stores are open six days a week.)

An easy place to start shopping is downtown. Here are three of Dallas' major department stores: Neiman-Marcus, Sanger-Harris and Joske's. Downtown also offers numerous men's and women's apparel shops, shoe stores, eating places and theatres. A below ground pedestrian walkway system called "The Tunnel" links downtown office buildings, banking facilities, restaurants, shops and parking. (In between shopping expeditions, take time to relax in the city's beautiful open park, Thanks-Giving Square — a downtown garden with trees, fountains, a bell tower and chapel.)

Spread out around the city like spokes on a wheel are several very popular enclosed shopping malls — NorthPark, Big Town, Prestonwood Town Center, Town East, Valley View, Red Bird and Dallas' newest, the Galleria.

Antique buffs will enjoy McKinney Avenue and Sale Street, where shops are located in old homes with histories of their own.

Although many of the best shopping finds are within walking distance of the Fairmont Hotel, shoppers who prefer to ride need not worry. Within the city, a municipally-operated bus line operates one of the most modern transit fleets in the nation along an efficient network of local, express and crosstown routes. For the convenience of the downtown shopper, there are "Hop-A-Bus" routes, offering downtown service for the nominal fee of 25 cents a ride.
