

WARNER INDIAN RANCH

EXPECTED TO TAKE PLACE WITHIN A SHORT TIME—ALL WHITES ARE OFF THE RANCH AND THE ROADS ARE ALL CLOSED.

Sam Taylor, foreman of Warner's ranch, John Kohn and J. M. Sanders, who are also employed upon the ranch, are in this city as witnesses in the cattle stealing case. If they could be made to talk, it is believed they could tell of the Indians removal, but it is evident they have been requested to keep their views to themselves.

Sam Taylor told a little in regard to the present condition of affairs. He stated it was true that white people had been ordered from the Hot Springs, but it was not true that he had ordered Dan McPherson away. Dan is his brother-in-law and had as much right as he on the ranch. In spite of Taylor's talk it could be seen that he expects trouble before the removal takes place.

When asked concerning this matter, he said: "There are not enough Indians left up a row—there being only forty-five or forty on the whole ranch, and they might make things a little disagreeable by taking to the hills. I think, however, when the removal takes place, they will submit all right, one of us know when the removal will take place. In all probability it will soon, but as yet there is not a sign upon the place. Just how soon will be no one knows."

A report from Ramona last evening, stated that the party of seven ladies and gentlemen who were driven from Hot Springs last week, are staying there at the hotel. They informed the correspondent that Mr. Lummi has just left the road to the springs, thus closing all traffic.

The Indians who are in this city, have also come here for the trial, would say nothing, but appeared to feel bitter at the forced change.

A report from Los Angeles yesterday of Mr. Lummi's return to that city, he virtually admitted that there would be trouble.

"A month ago," he is reported as having said, "there was not one chance in 1,000 of there being any trouble over the removal of the Indians to their home. Now, thanks entirely to the adding of officious outsiders, there is more than a little chance of trouble. It is believed that an effort will be made either the latter part of this week or the first of next to make the removal which will be watched with great interest."

REPORT BY WIRE

The following dispatch from Los Angeles tells of how the removal is looked upon there:

"Los Angeles, April 20.—Dr. L. A. Wright, Indian agent at San Jacinto, Frank M. Cosser, special Indian agent from Washington, D. C., Chas. F. Lummi, chairman of the Warner ranch Indian commission, and Wm. Collier, attorney for the Mission Indians, have just returned from a trip to Agua Caliente, whither they went to perfect arrangements for the removal of the Indians from their old home to the new reservation at Pala.

"Members of the party arrived in Agua Caliente, the main village of the Warner ranch Indians, Thursday morning and were received sullenly and almost defiantly. The people were not inclined to make things easy and it was with difficulty a small adobe building was secured for the accommodation of the party. A junta was appointed for the afternoon at the school-house. The Indians held a private conference first to determine upon their method of procedure and arrived at the meeting an hour late. There were representatives from the outlying villages and the women of Agua Caliente attended in a body.

"Mr. Wright explained that he and his companions had come as friends to the Indians to help them prepare for the removal to Pala and make it as easy as possible for them.

"Several Indians made speeches protesting against the removal. One of them, Cibimast, the captain of the tribe, being particularly bitter against the change.

"Certain of the younger and more aggressive of the Indians signed to the officials their willingness to move to Pala. Many more are known to be secretly desirous of making the change, but are afraid to oppose the will of the majority. Foreman Taylor, of the ranch, acting under orders from the owners, has notified all whites that they must leave at once. Before being tampered with by white meddlers, the Indians have always been gentle, tractable wards of the government, and it is expected that with the removal of the source of trouble they will accede to the official orders. Indians must go, but every precaution that foresight and care can devise will be taken for their protection. The date of the move will be kept a close secret and none save those authorized by the government will be permitted to be present."
