Nurse to speak on child health Friday morning

Miss Ella Barkeley, state indus-
trial health nurse, will speak at
the Community Center Friday
morning at a meeting of a class
studying child health in wartime.
The class convenes at 9:30 and
is open to anyone interested.

Miss Barkeley's topic will be
"Wartime Labor Problems,
Health Implications." Mrs. Cars-
ten-Sonnicksen, director of
health for the Palo Alto Council
of Parents and Teachers, is ar-
ranging for a panel discussion.

At its meeting last Friday, the
class heard Dr. J. Russell Frantz,
medical officer of the bureau of
venereal diseases of the state de-
partment of public health, esti-
mate the cost of venereal disease
in the United States at \$1,000,000
a year.

Miss Ruth Mayer, city welfare
officer, pointed out the need of
a vigorous citizenry which would
assume the duty of keeping the
town clean. "It is much easier to
keep a town clean than to clean
it up after it becomes dirty," she
said. Both Miss Mayer and Dr.
Frantz expressed opposition to
organized vice.

M. C. Thiltgen, manager of the
Community Center, told of the
various recreational activities of-
fered Palo Altans—dancing par-
ties for various age groups, sea-
sonal sports, swimming, baseball,
Sunday hikes, and hospitality for
men in the service.

He told the group that there is
a need for some place in the cen-
ter of town where children can
gather to chat and play games,
now that local creameries and
similar gathering places are clos-
ing early.

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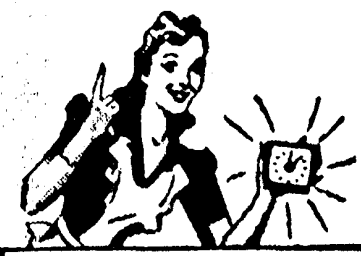
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
