In view of a remark which you made to Dr. Edgar some time ago concerning a case about which we had some information but which had not been reported to you, I am led to wonder whether you would like to inaugurate any more direct method of reporting cases of complaints than is now in existence. I have taken the point of view previously that if any case arose which seemed to have a significance, I would report it to you promptly, but that the general run of obviously unimportant cases need not be reported, although from time to time I have expected to classify the type of complaints and make a more or less detailed report to you.

I have no wish to burden you with more details than you wish, but on the other hand I am quite willing to give you whatever you wish in this respect. I would suggest, therefore, that you drop me a line and tell me just what you would like to have done in this connection.
