A picture of this man's chest was taken by Dr. Taft in September, 1941, and another in November, 1942, and Taft's report gives no indication of any condition due to his employment. However, we are getting Dr. Taft to send his plates on to Dr. Bendegast, to whom you doubtless will remember you referred us to some years ago, so as to get another reading and interpretation of these plates and inasmuch as this claim may wind up in the Courts, I am writing you with the hopes that you may be able to render us that assistance which has been so invaluable to us in the past.
