The American Medical Association, the professional society for physicians, has a membership over 213,000

Its Council on Occupational Health is concerned with the protection and improvement of the health of the nation's working population through promotion of occupational health programs Through its committees and the staff of the Department of Occupational Health, the Council encourages (a) the application of protective measures against health hazards in their working environment, (b) the placement of individuals according to physical, mental, and emotional make-up, (c) adequate medical care and rehabilitation of the occupationally ill and injured, and (d) personal health maintenance

The three committees of the Council are the Committee on Aerospace Medicine, the Committee on Occupational Toxicology, and the Joint Committee on Mental Health in Industry (Council on Occupational Health and the Council on Mental Health)

More than 70 statements and pamphlets prepared by the Council and its committees on various occupational health subjects are available from the Department of Occupational Health Although these are primarily directed to the physician or nurse, many are of interest to the safety professional Some of the subjects covered are occupational diseases, occupational dermatoses, hazard prevention, workmen's compensation, industrial nursing, and management relations

The Council on Environmental and Public Health is concerned with problems closely allied to occupational health Its areas of interest are those which pertain to the control of transmissible diseases, air, water and soil pollution, ionizing and other radiation affecting the public, traffic and public safety, health problems relating to population growth, urbanization, and technological changes bearing on ecology of man Publications on these subjects are available from the Department of Environmental Health
