If you get your drinking water from a public water system you can contact your local water supplier and ask for a copy of your Consumer Confidence Report also known as an Annual Water Quality Report. This report lists what regulated chemicals, microbes and bacteria may be in your drinking water and whether the system meets state and [EPA drinking water standards](#).
