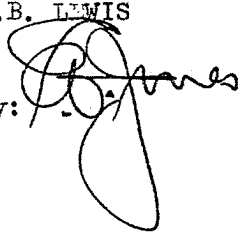

Attached is a letter from Lumber Mutual Casualty Insurance Company of New York on the case of [REDACTED] vs. Danforth, with which you are undoubtedly familiar. We are therefore passing it along for your handling.

The question raised by Mr. Fitzgerald as to the concentration of leaded Sinclair H-C "regular" gasoline probably does not affect the situation to any great extent but for your information our records indicate this grade of Sinclair gasoline in the area near Syracuse during the last year has varied from .92 to 2.00 cc per gallon.

Gentlemen:

I wrote you on July 27, 1942 in regard to the above matter in which one [REDACTED] claimed that he had contracted lead poisoning as a result of washing his hands and arms twice a day for about three weeks with H-C Sinclair "regular" gas.

You referred my letter to Dr. Robert A. Kehoe, Kettering Laboratory of Applied Physiology at Cincinnati, Ohio, whose assistance has been of great benefit to me in the proper analysis of this claim.

I would greatly appreciate your further assistance at this time. Mr. [REDACTED] bases his claim now on the alleged fact that he contracted lead poisoning from washing his hands and arms with H-C Sinclair "regular" gasoline. I supposed the word "regular" distinguished this particular gasoline from the so-called high test gas and tetra-ethyl gas.

The question I would like you to answer is whether HC Sinclair regular gas contains any lead and if it does, in what proportion?
