ORDINANCE NO. 493

AN ORDINANCE SUBMITTING TO THE ELECTORS AT A SPECIAL ELECTION TO BE HELD ON MARCH 14, 1930, THE QUESTION OF TRANSFER OF THE MONEY IN THE PALO ALTO SUBWAY FUND TO THE FUND FOR THE ACQUISITION OF THE UTILITY DISTRIBUTION SYSTEMS OF THE PACIFIC GAS AND ELECTRIC COMPANY IN THE FORMER TOWN OF MAYFIELD. The Council of the City of Palo Alto DO ORDAIN as follows:

WHEREAS, the electors of the City of Palo Alto at an election held on the 14th day of May, 1914, authorized a bonded indebtedness of the city for the sum of Ninety-five Hundred Dollars (\$9500) to construct the city's proportion of a subway at Palo Alto Avenue and Alma Street in said city, out of which there has been expended for costs Thirty-three and 90/100 Dollars (\$33.90), and

WHEREAS, said subway was

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not constructed and the Railroad Commission of the State by its order has authorized the continuance of the grade crossing at said point indefinitely and

WHEREAS, the expenditure of said money for the purpose for which said bonds were voted is impracticable.

NOW THEREFORE, this Council finds the foregoing recital of facts are true, and it hereby orders that the question of transferring the balance of money, to wit: The sum of Nine Thousand Four Hundred Sixty-six and 10/100 Dollars (\$9,466.10), now in said fund, to a fund for the acquisition of the Utility Distribution Systems of the Pacific Gas and Electric Company in the former town of Mayfield, be submitted to the electors.

That for said purpose the question of said transfer of the sum of Nine Thousand Four Hundred Sixty-six and 10/100 Dollars (\$9,466.10) shall be presented at a special election to be held on Friday, March 14, 1930, to be voted on by the electors of said city, and said date is hereby fixed for said purpose, being the same date for which a special election is called by Ordinance number 492 published in the Palo Alto Daily Times on March 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 10, 1930; and it is hereby ordered that this ordinance be published on the same days as said Ordinance referred to, and to which Ordinance attention is called for further information, as to the purpose of this proposed transfer of money.

In addition to the two propositions on the ballot for the acquisition of the Gas Distribution and Power and Light Distribution Systems of the Pacific Gas and Electric Company, the question for said transfer of the money now in the "Palo Alto Subway Fund" to the acquisition of the said Utility Distribution Systems shall be printed on the said official ballots to be used at said election substantially in the following form:

"SHALL THE CITY OF PALO ALTO TRANSFER THE SUM OF NINE THOUSAND FOUR HUNDRED SIXTY-SIX AND 10/100 DOLLARS (\$9,466.10) FROM THE PALO ALTO SUBWAY FUND TO THE FUND FOR THE ACQUISITION OF THE UTILITY DISTRIBUTION SYSTEMS IN THE FORMER TOWN OF MAYFIELD?"

After said question hereby submitted to the electors of the city, there shall be placed in squares after the question the words "Yes" and "No"; voters approving the transfer will stamp a cross in the square after the word "Yes," voters disapproving the transfer of the money will stamp a cross after the word "No."

It requires two-thirds of the voters voting on this question to authorize the transfer.

The election precincts are hereby constituted and shall be the same as the election precincts provided for in Ordinance number 492; and the election officers shall be the same for said special election on this question, reference to which ordinance is hereby made for further particulars. Electors residing in said consolidated precincts are qualified to vote in the consolidated precinct in which they reside.

ley men started the scoring, this time first by a free-throw by Phillips, and followed by a "cripple" by Chase. This start caused the Palo Alto boys to settle down, and the hosts scored no more for the whole game except for three foul throws, widely separated. Ericson did Trojan work in this last half. He started with a cripple, followed quickly by a foul throw and then another cripple shot. The first of these goals was on the worst blunder the Yellowjackets made, and a worse one than any team should make. The Palo Altans got the ball outside on the end line about 10 feet from a point beneath the basket. Ericson was near the end line about an equal distance toward the opposite side of the court. Somehow the Yellowjacket who was supposed to be guarding the "Phantom" lost his charge, and while all the players gathered around the Palo Alto man who was to pass the ball in, Ericson stood calmly out, from the crowd, free as air, took the pass, dribbled, made the easiest shot of the evening. The Berkeley man hardly knew the goal had been made. Later Ericson scored on a long one and another cripple. Clayton

("Bones") Roberson did his bit for the score by a great shot, let loose as he went flying beneath the basket and while he was three feet off the ground. He also scored on another cripple later. Lacombe put the finishing touch on the score that won the championship with a long shot near the end. The reserves had hardly enough time to get set and started before the gun barked, so no goals were made by them.

The speed attained by the Vikings in the second half was marvelous. They no sooner got the ball than they would be down the floor at the goal. They kept Coach Jack Eadie busy shunting his men back and forth, for the Yellowjacket man-to-man defense was killingy exhausting against the Palo Alto boys' pace. At times the speed would be so great that the momentum would carry the ball out of the Vikings' control. This caused a bad-looking error or two, but they meant nothing while the boys made up for them by playing faultlessly most of the time.

Today the victorious Palo Alto boys will turn in their suits, some of them probably never to get into one again. Most of them have carried the Red and Green for the last time, and Palo Alto bids good-bye to a truly magnificent team.
