Dear Dr. Shafer:

We are enclosing herewith analytical report on the urine of Mr. [REDACTED] #219-182.

In view of the absence of any lead in the specimen, it would seem unlikely that any acute symptoms now present are related to lead. However, the sample is rather small and if there has been a considerable interval - 6 to 8 weeks - between his exposure and the collection of the samples, a figure such as the above is possible.

It might be a good plan to secure a 2-1/2 or 3 liter sample on this man after he has been back at work a week or two, that is, if you wish to estimate the magnitude of his exposure in the Paint Department.

P.S. The count of 12 stippled cells per fifty fields on the blood smears is not remarkable and can not be considered as evidence of abnormal exposure.
