American Foundation of Occupational Health

At the annual meeting of the Association held in the Association offices in Chicago on June 22nd, 1945, one of the important items of business voted on was the creation of a Trust to be known as the "AMERICAN FOUNDATION OF OCCUPATIONAL HEALTH" to enable our Association to set up opportunities for undergraduate and postgraduate training in the specialty of industrial medicine

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and surgery. It was also voted that the American Association of Industrial Physicians and Surgeons make the initial contribution to this Trust in the amount of \$500.00, and this has been done. This meeting was held in line with the Notice of Meeting and proxy form sent to all members thirty days prior to the date set, to enable your officers to carry on the business of the Association and proceed with the election of officers in accordance with the corporation laws of the State of Illinois covering our Association. We have now made application to the Commissioner of Internal Revenue for a ruling that contributions to this Trust are tax exempt, and as soon as we obtain this ruling, we can proceed with the raising of funds for this graduate fellowship program.

Central States Society of Industrial Medicine & Surgery - Mid-Winter Meeting

The Mid-Winter Scientific Session of the Central States Society is scheduled for Friday, December 7th, 1945, in Chicago. The morning will be devoted to a Clinic at the St. Luke's Hospital, and afternoon and evening sessions will be held at the Palmer House. It is planned to present the timely subjects of rehabilitation and placement of the returned veteran, and psycho-neurosis and psychosomatic medicine at the evening meeting, and men well known for their achievements in this field have been invited to talk on these subjects.

Postgraduate Course in Industrial Medicine

The Long Island College of Medicine, Brooklyn, New York, announces the presentation of the Fourth Postgraduate Course in Industrial Medicine - January 14th to February 1st, 1946. Afternoon and Evening Seminars and Morning Clinics devoted to intensive orientation in industrial medical administration, internal medicine in industry, the occupational diseases and industrial surgery are scheduled.
