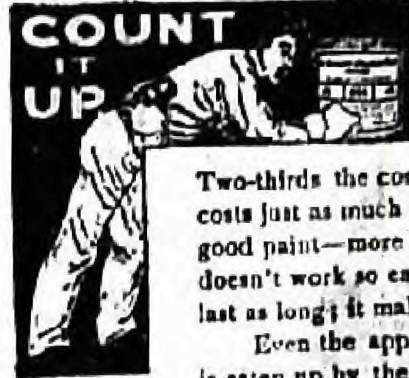
At the time the afternoon session convened the Council was in a hopeless tangle over the bond issues. Pierce tried to play both ends in favor of the public-school issue. Other Councilmen were equally insistent with regard to their pet projects. Finding they could not agree, the city fathers began by undoing all that they had done. The vote by which the ordinance for the polytechnic high school was passed was reconsidered, and the report of the committee was filed. A similar fate met the report on the library bonds.

With the field clear the Councilmen again tackled the common-school issue and went at each other hammer and tongs for about an hour. The discussion developed a strong disposition on the part of the Council to drop the polytechnic high school altogether. They are inclined to think that such a school will not materially lessen the congestion at the present High School.

Powers said he would vote for the common-school bonds if the high-school proposition was dropped. Walker was in favor of an independent investigation before action was taken. Pierce was in a great rush to have the ordinance adopted. Blanchard was ready to vote. Todd thought the Board of Education knew best.

Finally, Blanchard agreed to a postponement for one week. This course was adopted, as his defection did not have enough votes to pass the resolution. At the request of Pierce, President Powers appointed Walker, Allen and McLean a special committee to investigate the immediate necessities of the school department.

On one thing the Councilmen were able to agree—that was the necessity for the issuance of sewer bonds in the sum of \$1,325,070. Of this amount an outfall sewer is credited with \$643,349, an internal system of sewers with \$328,141 and a system of storm drains in the business center with \$464,440.
