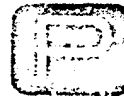

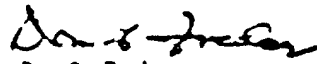
LEAD HYGIENE AND SAFETY BULLETIN
NO. 152 CORRECTION

To Members of the Lead Industries Association, Inc.:

An important error and misstatement of fact in this Bulletin has been called to our attention by one of our member physicians. Please note this correction in your copy so that further dissemination of the error is halted.

We stated incorrectly, as did the USPHS publication (Silicosis in the Metal Mining Industry--A Revaluation, 1958-1961), that data was given on the "prevalence" of lead poisoning among U. S. metal mine workers. The term "prevalence" is incorrect. In fact the figures reported giving "lead poisoning" should have been characterized as the number of metal mine workers who reported a past history of lead poisoning up to the date of the study. Since medical records were not consulted, nor examination of the employees made, the results reported by the U. S. Public Health Service should be given no greater significance than the previous statement warrants.
