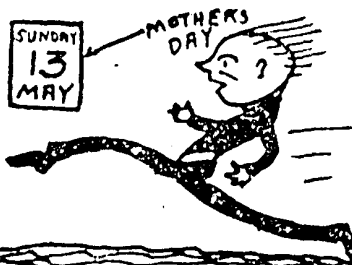


trict can borrow money at 2 or 3 per cent less than any private corporation. If the district is not formed the Eastbay Water Company will proceed to develop a new supply from a source of its own choosing. That source may be most unsatisfactory to the consumers. If we want pure mountain water and want to have a voice in where it comes from we must vote for this district on Tuesday. Otherwise we will take what we get and pay what the Railroad Commission declares is a fair return on the water company's investment. The Railroad

sues for other utilities aside from water. I wish to point out that before any bonds can be passed the people must vote for them by a two-thirds majority. Before any other utility besides water can be carried the people must vote by a similar majority. Surely, these are sufficient safeguards for any democracy.

"We are told that the five directors will have enormous powers. Our city council also has very large powers and the handling of large sums of money, and we do not hear any serious complaint against this form of government. It is also a fact that the charters of the Eastbay cities and the charter of Alameda county gives power, after a vote of the people, to take over railroads, telephones, disposal of garbage and other public utilities. The charters have had these provisions for many years, yet no one has attempted to set up a Socialistic form of government in our midst. There is no more danger in the proposed water district of the Eastbay cities going generally into the business of operating public utilities than there has been for many years of the cities and county taking this same step.

"Vote for the water district on Tuesday. This is your opportunity. Attempts are being made to sway your judgment by those who are financially interested in the continuance of the system of private ownership of our water. Do not be misled. These people are special pleaders and have their private fortunes and private interest at stake. You have the welfare of yourself and the welfare of your children at stake in Tuesday's election."

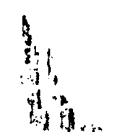
