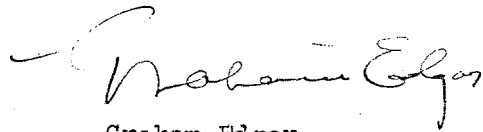

My dear Dr. Kehoe:

Some work has been done in the aviation field in the last year or so on the use of an injector for injecting aniline (or a 60% solution thereto in butyl and ethyl alcohol) into aviation gasoline to give it additional anti-knock value at take-off and under full load. The apparatus, I understand, is so designed that aniline is bled into the gasoline stream proportionally to the throttle opening which is approximately proportional to the need for anti-knock value.

We are probably going to be asked by the developers of this scheme for a license under our aniline patents. I believe that you have some fairly strong feelings about the use of aniline even from such a device as this, and I will appreciate your opinion as to what precaution should be taken if aniline is so used.
