The membership subscription reflects a special assessment of 30 per cent of the Ordinary, etc. assessment to be used for the Health & Safety Public Relations Program approved by the Board of Directors. These figures will be adjusted at a later date when your 1966 tonnages for lead mined, smelted and refined, and consumed in manufacture are made available to us. Minimum subscriptions of \$200 for regular members and \$1,000 for foreign producers are also subject to the 30 per cent special assessment.
