SHORT LIFE FOR BOYS FORECAST

Warden Says Leopold, Loeb May Go Twenty Years

Asserts Thirty-three Would be a Real Miracle

JOLIET, Sept. 13.—"If Leopold and Loeb are alive twenty years from now they will have accomplished the miraculous," said Warden Whitman of the Northern Illinois penitentiary today. "The average life of a 'lifer' is only ten years in prison. Perhaps Loeb and Leopold can expect fifteen years. They're young and if they behave themselves, they will be transferred to the new prison the first of the year, where surroundings will be much better. But—twenty years will be surprising and thirty-three years will be miraculous."

Warden Whitman is of the opinion that Judge Caverly's decision blocks any parole.

"I have read the verdict carefully and I consider it likely that the boys will die in prison."

GOVERNOR HAS POWER

Advice from Springfield, however, quote persons close to Gov. Small as holding he has the power to pardon or shorten the sentence of the murderers.

Great care will be taken to select proper cellmates for Leopold and Loeb. The warden said he will choose men who are able to lead the youths back to straighter conception of truth.

Leopold, (No. 1189) and Loeb (No. 1191), looked grotesque in their second-hand prison garments when they reported for work today. The pampered dandies, who always had valets to protect and care for their clothes, slumped about in those that did not fit and the sleeves of their jackets were so long they had to turn them back. They were aroused at 11:10 o'clock, tumbled from their hard, straw pallets, washed hurriedly in cold water, and had breakfast of hamburger steak, bread, butter, syrup and coffee.

PUT TO WORK

At 11:10 a.m. they were taken to the chapel where a motion picture was shown and immediately afterward were taken to the shop and set to work. Neither has ever done a lap of work and they were awkward, but their teachers displayed patience.

Yesterday and today, great throngs, out of all proportion to the usual number, flocked to the penitentiary, hoping for a glimpse of the murderers, but none have been posted everywhere. (No prisoners will be identified by the guards.)

easy to pass laws invading the fundamental rights of the private citizen because there is a public clamor for them.

In legal and analytical terms, he dissected various attempts in the past to invade the fundamental rights of the private citizens of this country.

"State courts, as well as national courts," he said, "have overturned laws that preferred one religion to another, that attempted to invade the educational rights of children that sought to do away with the right of trial by jury and that tended to permit imprisonment without trial."

"The injunction clauses of the Volstead Act and of the red light statute are throughout the country, coupled with the power to impose penalties of imprisonment for a year without trial by jury, are an indication of the possibilities of legislation when constitutional restrictions are removed."

Referring to what he termed "tendency during times of emergency and public clamor to pass statutes of great public demand," the Secretary referred to the criminal syndicates laws as an instance of this trend.

PLEADS FOR JUSTICE

Continuing, he said: "If, under the Constitution, it is possible to punish a man for belonging to an organization formed for criminal purposes, what would prevent a hostile Legislature making it a crime to belong to a labor union?"

"I believe I have said enough to demonstrate to thoughtful Americans that we should strive to advance the interests of the people and to protect their property under the guarantees of the Constitution."

"We should remember that in 150 years, under the wise provision of our Federal and State constitutions we have built up one of the greatest nations on earth, a nation which can be destroyed only by the fault, the incompetence or the unwisdom of her own citizens as other nations have been destroyed."

"Remember that we can prosper as a people only when we recognize the rights of others as well as insisting upon our own."

"Let us be prepared in heart and mind to meet every foe to liberty, both foreign and domestic and, please God, we yet shall see liberty enlighten the whole world."

OFFICERS CHOSEN

The banquet closed the fifteenth annual convention of the State Bar Association, the Secretary of the Navy being the principal speaker. Other speakers included Chief Jus-
