He enumerated the types, told how best to grow them and exploded the commonly accepted belief that they were irritating to the human species. He told his audience that one variety only—the Obconica, had been proven to be poisonous to persons susceptible to it.
Along with the talk on primroses, Mr. Logan spoke of fertilizers, soil treatment, the best method of turning hydrangeas blue and shrub pruning. Some 20 members of the section were present at the meeting and divided their time between the house and the attractive garden of the hostess.
