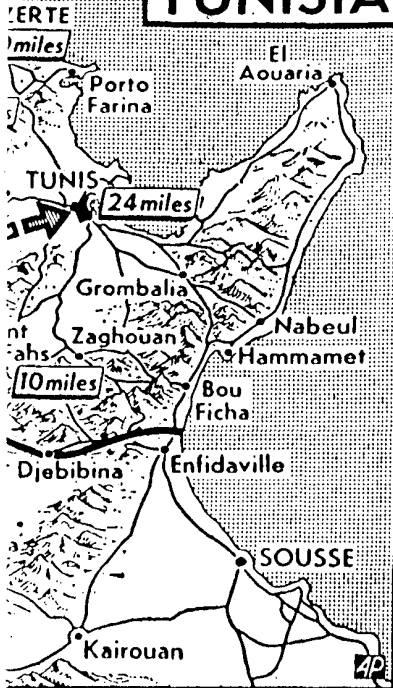




THREATEN AXIS DEFENSES

Hans H. Madsen dies in San Jose

Hans H. Madsen, who worked for Senator and Mrs. Leland Stanford on their ranch here for 11 years after his arrival from his native Denmark, died in San Jose yesterday at the age of 77.

He was one of the valley's leading orchardists and was active in San Jose business and civic affairs. Although he "retired" from business in 1918, he was appointed by the state building and loan commissioner in 1936 to take charge of the San Jose Pacific Building and Loan Association, which he headed until financial stability was reestablished in 1938.

Survivors are his wife, Emilie K. Madsen, and six children. Funeral plans are not complete. Mr. Madsen held membership in both the Masons and the Elks lodges.

Mrs. Jessie S. Jones dies at hospital here

Mrs. Jessie S. Jones, aunt of Mrs. Herbert Hoover and Mrs. Jean Henry Large, died today at the Palo Alto Hospital. She was 77 years of age.

Mrs. Jones, a native of Iowa, came here six weeks ago from Los Angeles. She was the aunt of Herbert and Allan Hoover, Delano Large, and Mrs. Robert Brooks.

Funeral services will be held Thursday morning at 10:30 at Alto Mesa cemetery chapel.
