

WARNED AGAINST HIGH WAGE OFFER

Union Woodsmen Told That
Humboldt Mill Owners Would
Make Dupes of Them.

The Eureka branch of the International Brotherhood of Woodsmen and Sawmill Workers has issued a large number of circulars warning lumbermen seeking employment in Humboldt county to disregard the promises of the mill owners, who are alleged to be offering high wages. The papers have been distributed broadcast by the union men of this city.

The union men in Eureka, in contention last February, adopted a minimum wage scale of \$10 a month. The circular states that, while the mill owners are not paying the schedule of wages adopted by the union, they are offering men \$65 to \$115 a month to go to Eureka and do the work with men who are now getting but \$30 a month.

"We warn you," the pamphlet reads, "that the reason the mill owners want to get you to come here is to prevent giving the wages they pretend to offer you. Their real plan is to use you for his purpose here, regardless of the hardship it may cost you. Instead of here being higher wages in the redwoods than elsewhere, the real condition is that wages average lower here than in any other lumber section on the Coast."

BONES OF FIRE VICTIM ARE FOUND

John Bowers Left to Die Last
April Despite Efforts of
His Friends.

The charred bones of what is believed to be the body of John Bowers, a barber who was burned to death on the 18th of last April, were found yesterday by workmen engaged in excavating a lot on Stevenson street, between Third and Fourth streets.

Bowers, who had come to this city from Philadelphia only a short time before the fire was pinned down by fallen beams and masonry, and although his friends worked like maniacs they could not free him.

He realized the situation and bade them save themselves.

Finally a squad of police rushed in and drove the would-be rescuers sobbing from the spot, and Bowers was left to die.

Charles Koch, business agent of the Barbers' Union has been notified and will inform the dead man's relatives in the East.

Noted Honolulu Dies.

HONOLULU, April 6.—H. J. Nolte, for fifty-five years a resident of Honolulu, died March 30th, aged seventy-three years. He first came here from

Hamburg in 1848 and until 1852 sailed as steward in vessels plying between Honolulu and San Francisco. He then started a restaurant in Honolulu which he continued until his death.

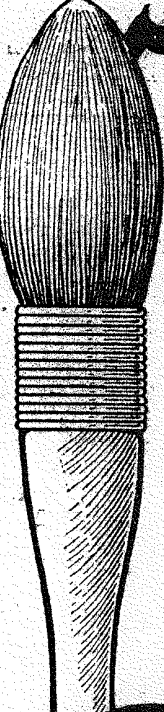

WASHINGTON, April 12.—The Treasury Department to-day purchased 200,000 ounces of silver at 66.062 cents per fine ounce; 100,000 ounces to go to San Francisco and the remainder to New Orleans.

\$22,500,000 SILK MILL MERGER FORMED

YORK (Pa.), April 12.—A silk merger, with a capital of \$22,500,000, was announced here to-day. The merger thus far includes the York and Monarch mills in this city, and Carlisle, Fleetwood and Reynolds mill, this State. The purchaser is the American Silk Manufacturing Company of New York. Plans are under way for the merging of a total of thirty mills, principally in Pennsylvania.



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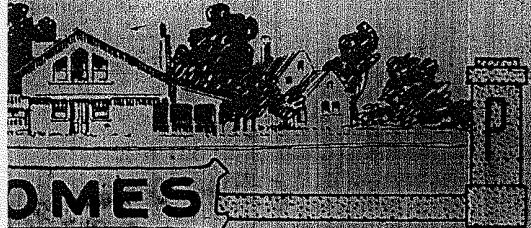
