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was somewhat handicapped in its construction of inadequate buildings, and is at present ready to erect suitable structures. When the Army was first inaugurated the members often were compelled to work under very trying circumstances. An old officer told of the time they were camped in barns, stables, or anywhere a building could be obtained. Once it was an old blacksmith shop with no flooring and only here and there a light. The shovels that brought the dirt made dust that filled the air and the heavy hand of the blacksmith served at night as a pulpit and a place where men and women sat and wept over wrong doing. Another meeting place was an old saw mill. Again there was no flooring, but a liberal supply of sawdust and rough-board seats called together for men who volunteered for the work, making a meeting house that was certainly an improvement over the blacksmith's shop, although the red-tiled room, which was visible from the inside, threatened to be forever shaken by the slightest wind, to come tumbling down.

"There were a great many places where the Army could have been housed, but the Army could have his choice in which to hold meetings. Needless to say, nothing but the best was wanted for a first-class meeting house. There were a great many rooms upstairs, which were used as shelter for poor men and a shoe-repairing room, where homeless men could spend an hour reading good books and the news of the day.

"No wonder the citizens were surprised to know that the Salvation Army would ever help to build and save those who perhaps had received their first start downward in that very notorious place. There was abundant evidence of the terrible state that had inspired them. The gambling table was fully equipped underneath with all sorts of electric devices, some to communicate with the saloon below for more drink, while others were for communication with the officers of the law should chance to stroll that way.

"There is still the fancy stripe of tiling that indicates where the front of the building was, but withstanding the early hardships, the Army struggled on through the years with its work, until now it is recognized as one of the foremost and most valuable agencies for spiritual and welfare services on the Pacific Coast."

UNIVERSITY OF REDLANDS

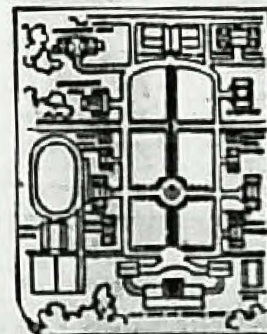
Knowledge is the world's
