LAMSON CASE

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In fairness to Moore the entire conversation should be repeated.

The prosecution objection rose in crescendo. But Judge Robert Syer permitted the questioning to continue.

will voice an apostrophe to the "Jawn" at the bowl with between 2,000 and 3,000 persons attending. At Los Angeles Coliseum an audience of about the same number will see Mary Wallace, another actress, enact the role of the Madonna in a pageant with 3,000 characters.

White doves will be released from the Tower of Legends at Forest Lawn Memorial Park to symbolize "the resurrection" in William Farnum's play, which will close the poem "God of the Open Air."

The poem was written by the late Dr. Henry Van Dyke and dedicated to the first service at Mt. Rubidoux in 1910. Tertius Van Dyke of Orange, N. J., son of the author, will recite the poem again at Mt. Rubidoux.

Boy Scouts in white uniforms will flank the Easter cross on Mt. Rubidoux at Catalina Island while Girl Scouts leave Mariposa from its base.

Choir to Sing in Canyon
Picturesque Red Rock Canyon in Mojave desert will echo with songs by a massed choir and an Obidian Butte, 10 miles northwest of California, there will be a choir and soloists.

The second oldest Easter sunrise observance began 14 years ago at Mt. Helix, national amphitheatre, 15 miles east of San Diego. More than 15,000 will attend the services by the Rev. Frank Lowe Jr., who dedicated his address to his father, Judge Frank Lowe of Kansas City who died recently.

Another sunrise service will take place east of Arroyo in Kern county with a colorful background of red flowers in countless shades of red, blue and yellow.

President and Mrs. Roosevelt and members of their household have arranged to lead the national public worship at St. Thomas church. Mrs. Roosevelt plans also to go to sunrise services at the Arlington amphitheatre.
