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MERITED OVATION REWARDS PIANIST

First, in modern French music and, second, in modern Russian, like the forte of E. Robert Schmitts, who has evening opened the Berkeley Musical Association's new season with a piano recital at Harmon Gymnasium. Except as it partakes largely of the logic of the French school, his playing is individual. It is unusually direct, sensitive as himself, delicate or sturdy as occasion demands.

The gymnasium was packed for him and the applause came periodically near cheers at times. It called him back when he was, literally, on his way home, to play for an encore a bit of mediæval clavichord music that was more ethereal, more otherworldly, than anything else he had offered and more subtle in its charm.

It was, with Chabrier's boisterous "Bourree fantasque" that Schmitts took his first victory. Sustained upon a brilliant technique with an independence of tone and a clarity of rhythmic outline he crowded the piece with vitality. Three familiar Debussy brevities, particularly the scintillant "Fireworks," were of a measure with this. Ravel, Villafranca followed; then the Russians, Lisapounov, Borodine and Balakirev. It was modernism with a vengeance, and a modernist to perform in that fashion only got in by the "Toccata" from the finale of his Fifth Concerto, over a technical tour de force.

The program opened with the G minor fantasia and fugue of Bach, as re-vamped by Liszt, and a group of Chopin pieces followed. The Liszt number was powerfully done. The Chopin numbers were pleasing, but not of unusual worth.

There was no question of Schmitts' virtuosity. He is a thinker and a poet, and these qualities dominate the emotionalism in him. He has his way not with a superabundance of warmth but with remarkable clearness, force and beauty.

Oaklanders Honored By Port Officials

Two Oakland men were yesterday honored by the Pacific Coast Association of Port Authorities, which ended a week's convention at Vancouver, B. C. Albert E. Carter, commissioner of public works, was elected president of the organization and Charles T. Howard, head of the Howard Terminal, was elected secretary.

Next year's convention of the association will be held in Oakland. It being a rule of the body to hold the annual convention in the city in which the head of the association resides.

Other officers elected at the close of the convention yesterday were: O. H. Kilpatrick, Vancouver, first vice-president; J. H. McCalkum, San Francisco, second vice-president; J. H. Burgess, Portland, third vice-president; Rufus Choate, San Diego, fourth vice-president.

Carter and Howard were not in attendance at the convention when they were chosen to lead it for the coming year; both having left there last Saturday to accompany J. Spencer Smith and R. F. Engle of New York to Oakland, where the two eastern port authorities yesterday inspected the waterfronts of Oakland and Berkeley.

MAIDEN VOYAGE IS SLOW. The Maiden voyage of the steamer "New York" to Buenos Ayres, arrived here yesterday. The trip was made in seventeen days, twenty hours, with calls at Rio Janeiro and Montevideo. The voyage took two days longer than was required by the steamer American Legion of the same line, which holds the record.

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
