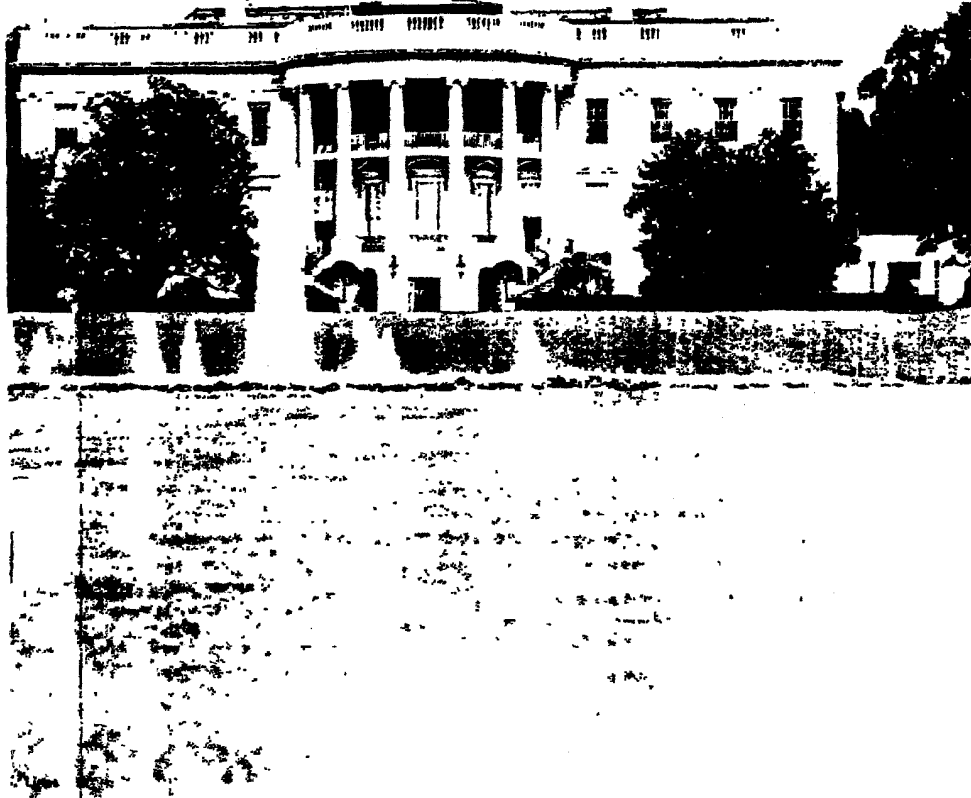

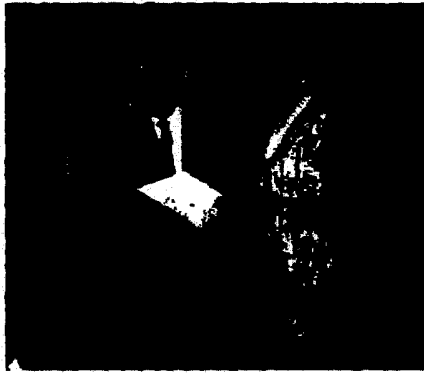

After more than 26 years with S-W PAUL MILLS retired on September 30, 1967.

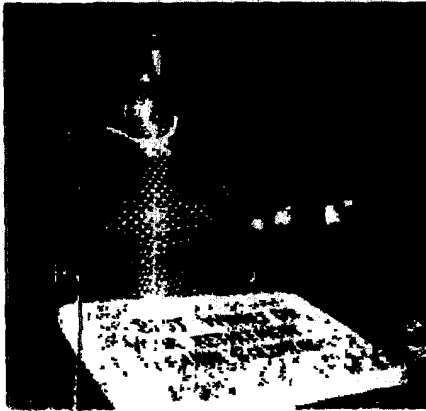

Pfc. Gerald Idziak of Grand Rapids is recovering from bullet wounds that broke both his legs in Vietnam.

The broken legs were the result of enemy action in Vietnam in which he was left for dead by the Viet Cong. Jerry was with Co. G 1st Bn 4th Marines, 3rd Div., participating in Operation Beacon Hill. As his Company debarked from the ship, about 400 yards from the Demilitarized Zone at Gio Linh, they were attacked by North

Vietnamese mortar fire. While helping evacuate some of his wounded buddies Jerry was shot.

A helicopter which came to evacuate Jerry and others was shot down and Jerry and his wounded buddies spent the night on the battlefield.

Jerry, who was stockkeeper at our Grand Rapids, Michigan Branch before entering service, has been uncomfortable, but happy to be back home.

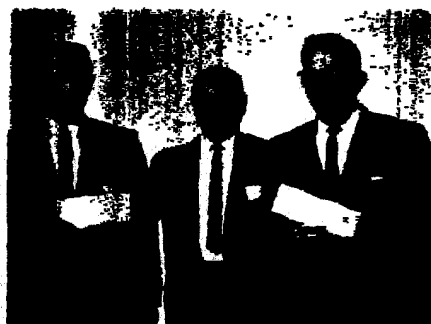

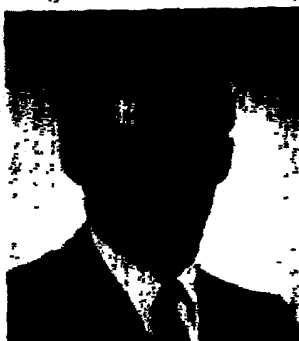

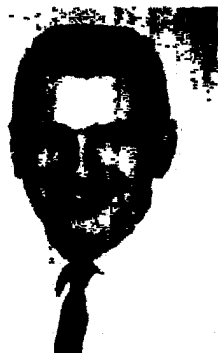
