"...in accordance with the request of the employer dated November 28, 1942, hereby approves a wage premium of 11¢ per hour above his regular hourly base rate of pay, for any employee while actually engaged in the hazardous handling or installation of spun glass and fiber glass, effective as of February 13, 1943."
