Speaker Discusses Kindergarten Aims

Mrs. Chasteen characterized kindergarten as "an insurance to the child against himself, against undesirable habits and attitudes which will interfere with his growth as a happy, well rounded, self-reliant personality." She believes the near future will find kindergarten abandoning the name, which to many uninformed people pictures a place where children play all day and become an integral part of the public educational system with every child passing through its developmental program.

Genius In Garret Day Gone, Swain Tells Students

"The day of the genius in the garret is gone," Dr. Robert Eckles Swain, head of the chemistry department of Stanford University, made that statement to a group of students gathered on the campus last night to learn from him the requirements and opportunities for major in chemistry and physics. The occasion was the 14th and closing talk of a series given during winter and spring quarters under auspices of the vocational guidance committee headed by Dr. C. Gilbert Wrenn of the registrar's staff.

"Scientific men now have to co-operate with others," Dr. Swain said. "They need skill plus personality. Look in the looking glass once in a while. Your personal appearance, as well as your ability to express yourself in correct and clear English, are invaluable aids to success."

Dr. Swain predicted that, like the great industries of Europe, future boards of directors of major industrial corporations are going to demand that business be directed in part by men who are scientifically and soundly trained. He stressed fully the underlying chemical and physical processes involved in operation of the plant.

Men who have done thorough advanced work in fundamental subjects such as physics and chemistry are going to find more and more opportunities to serve in the leading industries of today to new world conditions, the speaker pointed out.

The addition of one or more years of study in the Graduate School of Business was pointed out as one possible avenue to success in the managerial field. Speaking especially to chemists and physicists, Dr. Swain added that the Graduate Schools of Business at Harvard and Stanford offered exceptional opportunities to students.

City Bankruptcy Measure Signed

WASHINGTON, May 24. (AP)—President Roosevelt today signed the municipal bankruptcy bill to allow scaling down of city obligations. He also approved a bill liberalizing naturalization and citizenship laws, particularly relating to women.

STRIKE RIOTS

an attempt by longshoremen to prevent the loading of two ships here late today.

(By the Associated Press)
National guard troops, flashing rifles and machine guns, went into action today against strike disorders in two sectors.

Ohio guardsmen were called out to restore order at the Toledo plant of the Electric Auto-Lite Company, where a series of riots raged through the night.

At Minneapolis three regiments of militia were mobilized to prevent further outbreaks in the truck drivers' strike.

The Toledo tumult was marked by pistol shots, flying brick and tear gas. Some 3,000 strikers and their supporters stormed the plant and kept 1,500 employees imprisoned in it all night. Police and company guards hurled tear gas bombs at the rioters, who refused to hold its ground and increased in numbers.

Many persons were injured, several requiring hospital treatment. The troops at Minneapolis were called out as a precautionary measure when the striking truck drivers rejected a tentative proposal of the National Labor Board. The strikers agreed, however, to a 24-hour extension of the truce which would have expired last night.

Congressman Arrested

UNION 'CELLAR' TO BE ENLARGED

Members of the board of governors of the Stanford Union yesterday afternoon voted their approval of expenditures not to exceed \$25,000 for improvements on the Union "cellar," restaurant.

The money will be spent for addition of a large sun room at the north end of the present building to accommodate crowds at rush periods. Kitchen space will be extended for installation of additional dish washing machines.

At present the plans for the new construction and remodeling are still in preliminary stages. Construction cannot start until detailed plans are worked out, it is pointed out.

Prof. William B. Owens, chairman of the Union Board of Governors, explained that the additions have been made necessary by the increase in the number of women students, anticipation of a larger enrollment next fall and cramped space in the present kitchen.

Moran will be retained, John stated, and the department will operate under a co-operative plan for the benefit of the Women's Service League, local chapter of the Red Cross and the Community Kitchen. Expenses of maintaining the shoe department will be shared equally by all three in exchange for shoe repairing service.

Since May 1 when the Community Kitchen was established a total of 3,528 meals have been served up to May 23. Of the total 2,020 were served to local people. The daily average of people fed at the Kitchen is 30.
