school. The students, as a plan, student activities and publications, the personnel of the high school faculty, the various courses of study that are offered, all are presented to the eighth graders. Representatives of the classes are chosen to interview the heads of departments to discuss specific questions and to report back to their own groups. Discussions and questions follow these interviews and class talks, so that every phase of high school may be thoroughly understood.

Helpful guidance is given by the eighth grade teachers in advising their pupils as to the suitable course of study to be followed in high school before they are ready to enroll. From the teachers' knowledge of the individual pupil's ability and natural interests, this guidance in planning a course of study may help to avert many disappointments and pitfalls.

As a climax to the study about the high school, a carefully planned trip is made by each eighth grade class to the high school itself while the classes there are in session. In this way the pupil have a first-hand knowledge of the physical plant, the layout of the classrooms, the procedure followed in changing classes, and what is perhaps the most important of all, an acquaintance, at least by sight, with the teachers and the new faces of their future classmates and associates.
