"Refusal of banks to bid on issue of State warrants, emphasize the absolute necessity of adding State revenue which the Legislature refused to provide," the Governor said. "With a deficit close to 1,000,000 inherited from the previous administration, and representing outstanding warrants we do not have such a situation as being out of funds to carry on ordinary operations and meet the appropriate made-for-SRA. Under the law are required to take up outstanding warrants with revenues as they come in and then we have to issue warrants to get the cash immediately needed."

REVENUE NEEDED

"Revenue must be provided to meet the deficit and reach the balanced budget. These new revenues will not be a hardship. They can be raised by a severance tax, by increasing the income tax on corporations and bank franchises, by closing loopholes in the present income tax without increasing the tax on the average person, and by revoking nonessentials."

"The State now has about \$800,000 in highway and various other funds. There is no reason why these funds when idle cannot be borrowed from time to time and then returned to meet exigencies in the general fund. I think too narrow a construction has been put on the intent of the constitution regarding highways and other funds and feel it is perfectly all right to borrow from these funds."
