DEAL OFF

That Road's Purchase of the Frisco Line Abandoned as a Result of the Merger Decision.

New York, April 14.—As a first result of the Northern Securities decision, the purchase of the St. Louis and San Francisco railroad by the Rock Island, according to semi-official admissions by leading interests in both properties, will be allowed to lapse. This action, it is understood, represents the mutual desire of both parties.

New York, April 14.—A leading interest in the Rock Island company announced today that the proposed purchase of the St. Louis and San Francisco road had been abandoned for the present. Negotiations may be resumed later.

This same authority declares that the failure of the plan has nothing to do with the recent decision in the Northern Securities case. It was simply a question of price, and the parties concerned failed to come to terms.

Gossip in Wall street has it that those in control of the road asked more cash than the other side saw fit to give.

Officials of the Frisco in this city decline to discuss the matter.
