Dear Mr. Kohr:

Thanks very much for your letter of June 4th which I believe settles our arrangement on a mutually satisfactory basis.

We shall be prepared to begin the clinical work on your men on August 1st. It was my understanding that you and your associates considered it feasible for the men to be brought here for examination. It seems probable that we shall have to arrange a schedule for the examination of these men which will not result in too much inconvenience to you and interference with the work in the plant. For our part we shall not be able to take care of more than four men on any one day, and we might find it just as convenient to have only two men at a time. In this way the work could be done almost exclusively by one man with the assistance of a technician. If your people will give some thought to this question and will let me know what you think will be most satisfactory, we shall try to arrange matters on this basis.

It is probable that we shall make some observations on the conditions in the plant before the clinical work begins. In any case it is not our intention to allow this matter to drag along but we will fit it into our other work as conveniently as possible, but with the idea of getting it done expeditiously.
