

FULL VOTE OUT

AT LEAST IT WOULD SO SEEM FROM THE INTEREST TAKEN IN THE BONDING QUESTION.

Advocates Are Numerous of All of the Propositions While the Opponents Are Not Only One Opposing Organization.

It would seem that the interest taken and shown in the bond election which is to take place on Saturday is much larger than any similar proposition has been able to awaken for a long time. There is active advocacy of the bonds in all lines and there is some opposition to some of them, in some quarters. The bonds have been endorsed by many where they have been denounced by but few.

After a debate in which all of the speakers were on one side, and that in favor of the bond issue, the Federated Trades, which is the representative of organized labor throughout the city, endorsed the bonding propositions one after another until all were endorsed. Practically the same action was taken by the Golden Hill Citizens' club at a well attended meeting in which also the action and debate was all in favor of the entire issue.

Only one organization has come forward as opposed to the bonds and that opposition was made public through the letter to the people signed by the executive committee of the Citizens' union. That action was being repudiated yesterday by members of the union, who were not willing to have their sentiments voiced by the committee and who criticize the action because there was no effort made to get an expression of the members of the organization, because possibly the expression made would not have been in accordance with the sentiment of those who presumed to act for all.

Mr. Marston says that he is a member of the Citizens' union, yet in the expressions of opinion on the bonds as published on Sunday morning last his was one of the strongest in favor of the entire issue and of a forward move-

ment for the welfare of the city. Charles S. Hamilton, who says his name appears on the roll of the Citizens' union says that the expression of sentiments made by the executive committee do not accord with his own, as he intends to stamp a cross in favor of each one of the proposed bond issues.

In other columns of today's paper will be found expressions of sentiment from Jesse Gilmore, Homer H. Peters, A. E. Dodson and S. W. Kroff, who give reasons for the faith that is in them.

The water and sewer extension bonds seem to have the warmest support and the B street bridge proposition has more friends than the average. Yesterday there appeared on the street and in the hands of the people a circular signed by Klauber, Wangelheim Co., Simon Levi, Bailou & Cosgrove, Hamilton Brothers, G. W. Marston and W. L. Frevert. It favors the B street bridge bonds and says:

"When constructed these bridges will span two canyons, which cut off all communication between the city and the country lying directly east of San Diego, except that which goes by a circuitous route. It is all important that San Diego should be brought into close touch with the county. Direct and good roads into every productive and scenic section of the country are worth striving for. We must have good roads, yards for pleasure seekers, and good roads for rural residents to drive to the city to do their marketing."

A portion of the letter is devoted to a diagram showing the two circuitous routes to El Cajon, by way of La Mesa and the other by way of Chollas valley. The proposed direct route via B street with the locations of the two desired bridges is also shown.
