Dear Mr. Webb:

Thank you for your letter of May 23. I assure you that I had every confidence that you would see this thing in exactly the same manner that I have viewed it. I should be altogether agreeable to meeting you in Chicago to discuss this matter with Mr. Parks, at any time that meets your convenience, provided you will let me know one day in advance. So far as I know now I have no conflicting engagements in either the week of June 4 or June 11. I should prefer, however, to take care of this as soon as possible for a variety of reasons. However, do not let that deter you from arranging it for the week of the 11th if it meets with your greater convenience.

I quite agree with you that it is advisable to take the matter first to Mr. Parks, and, though I have personal reasons for not having further commerce with him, I will smother my personal inclinations and meet him on any basis you suggest. If I am somewhat skeptical of the likelihood of our getting results through Mr. Parks, it is only because of my previous relationships with him.
