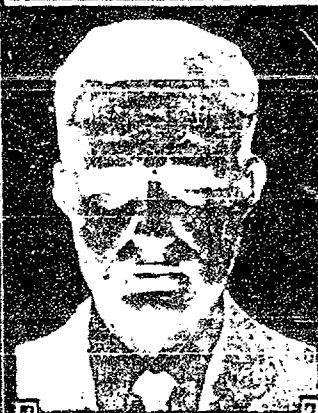
On the eve of its biggest offensive
 against the rum fleet, high officials of
 the Coast Guard admitted yesterday
 that no fewer than sixteen mem-
 bers of the Station Island unit were
 in jail on charges of corruption in
 connection with rum smuggling.

The admission came as the Coast
 Guard on Station Island was being
 shaken up. 200 men on thirty-two
 boats being transferred among these
 boats. The shake-up affected all but
 boatswains and followed a visit by
 Capt. W. V. E. Jacobs, local com-
 mander, who announced stronger
 measures to "exterminate" the rum
 fleet.

The campaign which The World
 has waged almost single-handedly
 against sale of tetraethyl leaded
 gasoline, pending scientific determi-
 nation of the charge it is a menace
 to public health, brought a statement
 from the Ethyl Gasoline Corporation
 last evening that it would suspend
 sales indefinitely, beginning to-day.
 This action was taken a few hours
 after The World sent telegrams to
 officers of the company and to di-
 rectors of the Standard Oil Company
 of New Jersey and the General Mo-
 tors Corporation, which jointly own
 the Ethyl Gasoline Corporation, ask-
 ing if they did not permit sale of the
