Dear Mr. Staslin:

I have no objection whatsoever
in your mentioning the work which we are doing to
the members of the Industrial Commission of Ohio,
when they inspect your Newark plant.

Incidentally, you may now add
that animals exposed to fiberglass for a year's time
fail to inhale any glass in fibrous form. A little
of the granulated material produced in fracturing
this material gets into the lungs in the form of
particulate matter and there sets up very slight
amounts of benign chronic inflammatory reaction.
However, I shall make mention that we are not going
to encounter any evidence of an asbestos-like reaction
because the glass does not penetrate the interior of the
lungs.
