affairs. Further, he denounced
the administration for consid-
eration of a national sales tax.
Truman made it clear that
his silence has ended and that
from now on until the 1956 elec-
tion, he is going to raise his
voice against the Republican
Administration.

He accused the Republicans
of using "double talk" in the
last election campaign and of
making promises which they
have shown no disposition to
fulfill.

He said:
"The principles they pro-
pose sound fine but they will
be judged by what they do,
not what they say. Double
talk may have won the last
election, but it won't win the
next election."

Truman said the Democrats
"can't wait" to begin trying to
regain control of the govern-
ment in the 1954 Congressional
and the 1956 presidential elec-
tions.

"Right now," he continued,
"the most constructive thing
I can suggest . . . is the elec-
tion of a Democratic Con-
gress next year. That will do
more to help the situation
than anything I can think of
for this year and next. We
can't wait. If we do, the coun-
try and the world will go
down the road to ruin."

He said that the Democratic
Party must take governmental
control "away from big business
and return it to all the people
where it belongs." He added:
"The Republicans say they
are for a stronger national de-
fense—then they lop another
thousand planes off the Air
Force. They say they are for
better housing but they kill
off public housing and raise
the interest rate so it is hard-
er to build private housing."

"They say they are for a
career service in government
but they keep right on firing
career servants to make way
for political appointees."

"They say the farmer
should get his fair share of
the national income, but farm
prices now are well below par."

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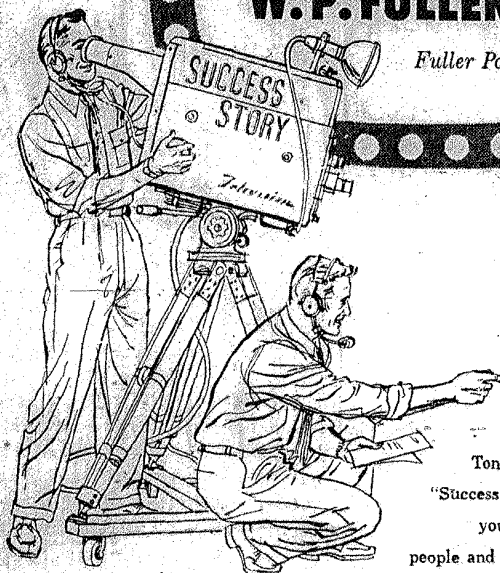

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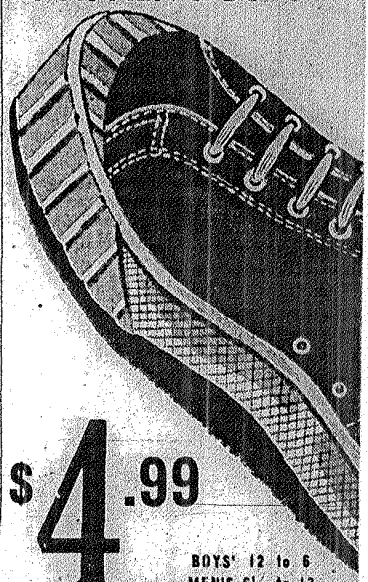
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
